### March's Meeting

The March meeting featured Bradley Dichter giving an extended demonstration of Adobe Type Manager Deluxe, (see photo at right) designated by Bradley as the premiere font managing application for the Mac.

Questions were asked as he demonstrated, and subjects discussed included:

- ▶ Managing fonts under the forthcoming Mac OS X 10.0.
- ▶ The competition products *Suitcase*, MasterJuggler and Font Reserve - and how they compare with ATM Deluxe.
- ▶ Adobe Type Reunion Deluxe, the font menu companion to ATM Deluxe, versus the free-standing MenuFonts.
- ▶ The importance of examining fonts for damage in order to avoid crashing.
- ▶ Resolving duplicates.
- A warning not to load fonts directly from removable media.
- ▶ Permanent and temporary font sets were explained.
- Each of the preference choices was explained in detail, ie., global versus application specific auto-activation and preserve either line spacing or character shapes.

The well-attended demonstration held the audience's attention so well that the presentation continued in place of the Photoshop Special Interest Group.

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#### Acrobat 5.0 arrives.

We knew it would come out eventually, and we caught a whiff of it last year when *Illustrator* 9.0 included

the ability to save files as PDF with *Acrobat 5.0* compatibility. Now *Acrobat 5.0* is finally here, and we're offering you a sneak peek at its treasure trove of new features.

There's definitely something for everyone in this list of application capabilities:

IT professionals will be glad to discover

that Acrobat 5.0 is designed to be installed and upgraded over a network. It can automatically check either Adobe's Web site or an internal file server for updates, or this feature can be turned off for single users or for an entire site. Installation preferences and included functionality can also be set centrally.

In response to what may well be the mostasked question on PDFzone's PDF mailing lists and in other venues, *Acrobat* now includes an export option for text (RTF). No longer will users have to go in search of third-party solutions for turning PDFs into Word documents. Of course, document authors have the option of blocking text and graphics export when creating PDF files, which will no doubt spawn a whole new series of frequently asked questions.

Getting graphics in and out of PDFs is a lot easier in *Acrobat 5.0*, too. PDFs can be exported in TIFF, JPEG or PNG formats. A new command, *Open As Adobe PDF*, allows you to

convert BMP, GIF, HTML, JPEG, PCX, PNG, TIFF and plain text files to PDF on the fly, by simply opening them in *Acrobat*.

Acrobat 5.0's 128-bit encryption means expanded security options when creating and saving PDF documents. Users have the option of sticking with Acrobat 4-style security options or using 128-bit Acrobat 5.0 security. The former works pretty much the way security options do in Acrobat 4.0, with the Do Not Allow Selecting Text and Graphics option

### TIP!

#### Docking Palettes in Freehand 9:

You can dock several palettes together by Command-Control-Dragging them next to each other. To undock a palette, Command-Control-Drag it away. Docked palettes are useful because they open, close and move together as well as save screen space.

# Selecting objects with Lasso tool in Freehand 9:

Freehand includes a new Lasso tool that lets you select anchor points by surrounding them. To tell Freehand to select the entire object(s) instead of just the points contained in the Lasso's selection, double-click the Lasso and check Contact Sensitive.

► Freehand 9 now lets you select everything that's not currently selected by choosing: Edit > Select > Invert Selection.

### What's happening on June 8th?



This is a request for patience.

By the time you read this message, *Mac OS 10.0 (OS X)* will have been released. This is new System softwear; companies will need time to

write or rewrite compatible software in order to take full advantage of this long-awaited major upgrade. We may have to wait a few months for their new products to be tested and released.

We have been advised that *OS X* will be shipping with a copy of *Mac OS 9.1* included. Why? This coupling will enable you to have the abil-ity to switch back and forth from *OS X* (where you can run your newly-upgraded software) to *OS 9.1* (where you can run your favorite classic, yet-to-be-upgraded software). This concept will ease your transition to *OS X* and will include downloading the latest upgrades from the Apple Web site.

As a result of our efforts to get LIMac members the latest Macintosh information, we have just received word that Kevin Boland, a Senior Apple Systems Engineer, will be making a presentation about *OS X* at our general meeting on June 8th. Don't miss it! It's a major Macintosh event.

#### From Donald Hennessy:

Because I have some fonts from the mid 80's, hearing Bradley Dichter explain about how *Adobe Type Manager Deluxe* can check fonts and prevent a corrupted one from freezing my machine was very good for me. I don't have thousands of fonts, but Bradley's tip to keep each font family grouped together to simplify use and updating was helpful.

ATM is available at www.adobe.com for \$65 for those who wish to turn fonts on or off – or be opened for use automatically. I noticed that (the printing only) version of Type Manager Lite is free. That's just the thing for my next "LIMac Welcomes You!" signs.

### **Technical Corner**

▶ My iMac DV SE was crashing. I reinstalled *Mac OS 9.0.4* and everything, but now, clicking on any file, I get the message *Cannot find application*. What can I do to fix this?

Rebuild the Desktop. In case anyone forgot, you need to restart, wait for the last startup icon to appear, which is usually *ATM*, then hold down the *Command-Option* keys until you get the dialog box asking if you wish to rebuild the Desktop on Macintosh HD (or whatever your Hard Drive has been named) You can let go of the two keys and click the *Rebuild* button. If you have more than one volume, then you will be asked again for each. This should re-link your files to your applications.

▶ I'm looking for a recommendation of a backup device I can use on my laptop and desktop. They both have USB and the desktop also has *FireWire*.

Consider a CD-RW that can connect to both types of port and take advantage of the FireWire speed of the desktop. VST's portable 4x4x20x FireWire drive (#FWCDRW-F, \$300 list) with optional (#CDRWCBL-USB \$60) USB cable. See www.vsttech.com. Faster is the 8x8x32x Kanguru CD-RW Portable. See www.interactivemediacorp.com/8x8x32x.html. The drive alone sells for \$280 but the Fire-Wire KanguruCable is \$80 and the USB KanguruCable is \$50. So the complete package costs more, but you do get a flexible drive that takes better advantage of FireWire's speed.

### ► How about a good scanner for under \$300 for the same machines?

The \$200 Microtek ScanMaker 4700 has 1200 by 2400 dpi resolution and comes with a little adapter for scanning 35mm slides or strips. It has a USB connection which is fine for most uses. The *FireWire*-equipped scanners are too expensive. I personally have the legal size and also SCSI equipped ScanMaker X12USL. That model goes about \$300.

▶ I have a cable modem and three computers. I want to share it using *Ethernet* cables. I was told to buy a Farallon hub. They also told me to check with my network administrator, which I don't have at home. Do I need some software?

### TIP!

### Creating smaller PDF files in *Acrobat*:

When creating PDF documents, often the most important consideration is how to keep the size of the file as small as possible. There are a number of ways to do this, but the most effective are:

- ▶ Use as few fonts as possible. This includes limiting the use of bold and italic (and bold italic) variations of a font, as each variation is really a separate font.
- Limit the use of graphics in publications to only those that are necessary.
- ▶ Use the compression options found in Acrobat Distiller's Job Options dialog box, such as Downsampling and JPEG compression.
- ► Use the subset option (located within the Font tab) of *Acrobat Distiller*'s Job Options dialog box.
- ► Use vector graphics for large, solid areas where possible.

changed to a No Content Copying or Extraction, Disable Accessibility option. With the new security controls, users can prevent document modification or allow it at four different levels. All of these settings can be included in batch processing sequences.

If you need to process huge numbers of files in Acrobat, or if you're just into efficiency, you'll love Acrobat 5.0's new batch processing controls, which really amount to a

scripting setup similar to the Actions feature in Photoshop and Illustrator. You can create custom sequences of commands, ranging from Number Pages to Audit Space Usage to Summarize Comments, and you can specify the usual options for each command. Batched files can overwrite the original files or be saved with new names and a full selection of file format options.

Printing options are greatly improved in

version 5.0. You can now tile oversized pages, and Print dialog box options allow you to print odd and even pages; rotate and center pages; specify overlap; print ICC colors as device colors: emit halftones, transfer functions, and undercolor removal/black generation; and select transparency quality.

You still can't spell check PDFs in their entirety, but Acrobat 5.0 does give you the ability to spell check Form fields and

Bookmarks are more differentiated in terms of formatting (they can now use bold, italic and color), and the Thumbnails panel generates thumbnails on the fly.

You can order Acrobat 5.0 today, for Macintosh OS 8.6 and better. \$249 (upgrades \$99).



### **DOS Formatting:**

With the OS 9.1 update, you no longer have the ability to format ZIP disks in DOS format. By downgrading to the previous version of the File Exchange 3.0.3 Control Panel from Mac OS 9.0, you regain the ability to format in DOS format.





#### Straightening a crooked scan in Photoshop:

To straighten a crooked scan, switch to the Measure tool (it looks like a ruler)



and drag this tool along the edge of your image. Then go to Image > Rotate > Arbitrary where the amount of rotation needed will already be entered into the Rotate field. All you must do is click OK to straighten the image. Scott Kelby

### **More Technical Corner**

What you need is an éAsant FR3004 cable/ router with a built-in four port switching hub, plus a short patch cable to connect the cable modem to the WAN port on the router and longer Ethernet cables to connect the router's other ports to the Macs. There would then be a fourth port free for a network-connected (and shared) printer. The only software you may need, not essential I would guess, is a firmware update from éAsant for the router. The software to browse the Internet and get e-mail comes with the modern Mac OS and can be downloaded for free from either Microsoft or Netscape and others for free plug-ins like Shockwave 8 and RealPlayer 8 Basic. Optimum Online is now apparently more lenient with using a router to share the service, as they legally require you to buy another cable modem and \$20/month service contract for each additional connected computer. Return the Farallon hub - it won't do you any good. Use a Web browser at http://memberservices.optonline.net/acctms/ index.html to create sub-accounts for each Mac, so they can all get separate e-mail. You can then set the mail preferences on each Mac for each account and sub-account. With all Macs now networked, you can share files back and forth and play network games against each other.

▶ I'm a first-time computer (Graphite iMac) owner/new member. Can vou make a printer recommendation under \$250. The Epson Stylus Color 980 is about \$200 and prints fast and sharp, especially on the glossy paper. For photos, the Epson Stylus Photo 780 would be smoother, due to it's sixcolor print head. For the edge on text quality on plain paper, the HP DeskJet 952C is excellent at \$200. Make sure to also buy a USB A to B cable to connect them to your iMac. Out of the price range, but worth mentioning, is the Lexmark Optra E312. It's a USB-connected black and white *Postscript* laser printer for \$400. Desktop publishers using programs like QuarkXPress need a Postscript printer and it's fairly cheap. For anyone needing *Postscript* on their old or new Epson inkjet, look for iProof Systems' PowerRIP 2000. HP DeskJet support starts at the \$300 for the 970Cse model. I should mention that Epson Stylus

RIP doesn't support any modern models and Strydent's *StyleScript* has been discontinued.

▶ I went to a Web site's front page, but could not navigate any further without a specified plug-in, which I did download and it did not work. What do I do? You need to install the plug-in after downloading the installer program, for it to work. I assume the Web site required either ShockWave or Flash. I've found that some Web sites don't work right with Internet Explorer 5, so I may switch to Netscape Communicator 4.7.6. Just copy the URL from Internet Explorer and paste into Navigator (the browser part of Communicator)

▶ Will my *Airport* work with DSL? I've used it on a analog dial-up and it works fine.

Only if you update to *Airport 1.3* so it now supports PPPoE. Ideally, I would use the Asante router and let it do the PPPoE and then the Airport can be used to bridge from the wired network of the router/hub to the wireless connection to the laptop and still have a wired connection for a desktop or two. The PPPoE connection may require a dialer program like *EnterNet* which can be a problem. Most notable is Mac OS 9's Software Update Control Panel. It wants to quit all running applications that will break your DSL connection as it forces *EnterNet* to quit, interrupting the update process.

▶ I have a Performa 6300 running Mac OS 8.0. When I start up, I get a message Desktop printer unknown error -192 at AT. What does that mean? (I have a GCC laser printer.)

The message means that some resource it needs is missing or damaged – a *PostScript* printer, I assume. You may have disabled the Desktop Printer Extension, but left the Desktop Printer Spooler. Check your Extension Manager. If none of the Desktop Printing files are turned off, then custom reinstall that part of the Mac OS, or better yet, download the free Mac OS 8.1 upgrade and install that, since there are many faults to version 8.0. When you're finished installing, allocate about 30K more to the *Desktop Printer Spooler* in the System Folder > Extensions folder and the Desktop Printer icon itself.



### **An Easy Way To Print Portions Of** Web-Pages:

Did you ever need to print just one little piece of information off a Web site, but when you try to print it you only end up getting five pages of paper with more then half of them being blank or just having half a line of text?

When you need to print a small portion of text off a Web page, simply center the text so you can see it all without scrolling and take a screenshot of the text you want by using the following key combination: Command-Shift-4. This will save a picture file of the information that you want to print on the Hard Disk.

Now, when you're ready to print, simply open the picture file (located in Hard Disk folder) and use the Command-P key combo to print the item. Printing may take a little longer using this method, but it sure beats wasting paper and ink printing an entire Web page.

### New OpenType Fonts



*OpenType* fonts are designed to accommodate a large number of special characters and ligatures.

The principal attraction is that an *OpenType* font file works in *Mac OS* or *Windows*, so you can now have a single font library for everyone in a workgroup.

Here's a sampler of some of the optional features that font foundries can build into *OpenType* fonts:

- ▶ Huge, multilingual character sets of up to 65,000-plus characters.
- ▶ Relatively smaller font file sizes which are better for font embedding.
- Automatic glyph substitution, for insertion of alternate forms such as ligatures, fractions, old-style numbers, titling caps, historical characters, and swash characters.
- Multiple optical sizes within a font family, so that type in various point-size ranges can be based on separate sets of character outlines, for finer display type and sturdier characters in small sizes.
- ▶ Class kerning, which allows letters with similar shapes (the left sides of c, e, and d, for example) or a single letter with a number of different accents to be kerned identically. This will dramatically reduce the size of kerning tables while more importantly extending the number of letter pairs that are kerned.

### Inside the package

OpenType is not an entirely new format. Instead, it's a hybrid, an extension to the *TrueType* format that adds a "pocket" for *PostScript* font data, so an *OpenType* font can contain either *TrueType* or *PostScript Type 1* font outlines.

### TIP!

### Specifying Measurements in QuarkXPress:

You can use simple arithmetic expressions (using operators such as +, -, \* and /) to specify measurements. For instance, you can move an object to the right one inch by typing +1" after the X coordinate value in the Measurements palette.

Hence, you can specify fractions of inches by using a division operation. So, to enter two and seven eighths, type 2+7/8 (or, if your default measure- ments are set to something other than inches, 2"+7"/8).
