MyBooks, a five-user accounting system for small office or home office businesses was the featured presentation at the May meeting. Fortunately, the owner and CEO of Appgen came personally to speak to LIMac. He knew the program inside out and gave a hands-on presentation, from a business point-of-view, of how to use this accounting program and interface with clients in collection calls. There were also a few tips on using collection calls as a sales tool – a little something extra that does not come with the manual.



EJECT THAT CD?

Some Mac users have found that they can't eject certain CDs from their machines. These copyprotected, audio CDs resemble compact discs, but are technically not, according to Apple.

The symptoms of this problem are: you insert an audio disc, which is not recognized by the computer; the disc will not eject; and the computer may start up to a gray screen after the disc is left in the drive. This problem can affect any Mac with an optical drive which will accept CD-ROM audio discs.

The solution to the problem begins with *not* inserting one of the questionable CDs into the drive in the first place. The discs with the copy protection can be recognized by the *absence of* the CD logo from the disc's printed label. Apple's Knowledge Base says, "In the logo's former place is the printed message, "Will not play on PC/Mac."

For the complete list of possible solutions

to removing the disc from the drive, see Apple Knowledge Base document 106882, entitled, "Mac OS: Cannot Eject Copy Protected Audio Disc, Computer Starts Up to Gray Screen." Following a list of troubleshooting procedures intended to remove a stuck disk, it states:

"If a disc with copyrighted protection technology remains inside the drive after following the procedures above, or if the computer does not start up normally, it is recommended that you contact an

President's Message

I think it's time to switch to *Mac OS X*, – if you haven't already. Many of my friends have and they love it. Last week, at the Developers Conference, Steve Jobs began by placing a *Mac OS 9* box into a coffin to demonstrate that all future development will revolve around *Mac OS X*.

If you're interested, start by confirming that you have a compatible Mac and verify that all the hardware and software you will be using is supported by *OS X*. Then be prepared to spend some time acquainting yourself with the way the new operating system functions. It's a little different (after all, it is UNIX based) but once you get the hang of it, it's pretty much the same old *Mac Operating System*, only it's more elegant and practically crashproof.

There's a lot of information available to help further – books, magazines and earlier this year we had a major presentation by Bradley. Don't be reluctant, LIMac is here to support you! Have fun and go for it.

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Bradley's Tech Session

▶ My original graphite colored Apple Airport Base Station doesn't seem to be responding, even after resetting and power off and on.

By a replacement. You don't have to spend \$300 on Apple's new white one. CompUSA had Apple's for \$150 and I see MacMall has the ORiNOCO RG-1100 Broadband Gateway for \$140 to which you can apply Apple's latest software to. Make sure it and the cable modem are plugged into at least a surge suppressor or better yet a small UPS like APC's Back-UPS Office BF 350 for \$40. Brief power outages happen all the time and upset your Internet access.

▶ I've been getting more junk e-mail lately and I see some of it was addressed to other recipients of my Internet provider. Do you think if I asked them, they would block the spammer? I tried the *Junk Mail* filter but all it does is flag things as junk mail. I doubt it. The spammers send mail to every recipient listed by each mail server. I have a cdr.net e-mail address and I see mail sent to undisclosed recipients of server.cdr.net and AOL users get the same thing. Outlook Express and Entourage has rules under the Tools menu to help filter out mail. I suggest making a rule that deletes the message if any criteria are met where the various criteria are subject contains whatever keyword offends you like mortgage, Viagra, penis, credit and also sender contains the domain part of the offender's e-mail address. This loose definition will catch the junk mail even if they change their exact email address. Don't do this for popular e-mail domains from real people like @aol.com or @yahoo.com. Also, use the criteria for message body containing offending keyword because some junk mail's nothing to do with the content. If you use Netscape Communicator it has filters similar to, but somewhat limited to Microsoft's Rules. There is a commercial product called *SpamFire* that is supposed to intercept your mail and, based on their keyword and domain lists, filter out junk mail. You can edit in good and bad lists and review the filtering and rescue stuff. I've found it causes too many problems to be worth the money. AOL mail does not have any filtering,

rules, mailboxes nor is supported by SpamFire

What is a PDF file & why is it useful:

Basically, a PDF is a format that was created by Adobe to allow for an easy way to share documents between different types of computers and for home graphic designers to easily send documents to printers such as Kinko's. The file, along with a copy of Adobe's Acrobat Reader can be viewed on any modern computer, be it Windows or Macintosh and your document looks identical on any computer, no matter the OS. If the file looks a certain way on your Macintosh it will look exactly the same way on a Windows computer, colors and all making the format an ideal way to show simple documents such as invoices or impressive documents like brochures the way they were made to be seen without the need to either run to the print shop to print and mail copies to a ton of different people.

Jaggies be gone in

Mac OS 9 uses unsmoothed fonts for small text elements. including the Toolbar Favorites in Internet Explorer, the message lists in Entourage, and the button descriptions in AOL Instant Messenger. Mac OS X does not always display unsmoothed text accurately, however. Small typefaces are poorly kerned and can be hard to read, and their jagged edges seem out of place in Mac OS X's highlypolished interface.

Thankfully, there's something you can do about it. Select System Preferences from the Apple menu, and click General (located in the first row). At the bottom of the window, you'll see an option for text smoothing. It's likely set to 9, meaning that all fonts that size and smaller are displayed without smoothing. Select 8 from the pop-up menu, and then quit System Preferences.

Now all fonts size 9 (and above) will be smoothed — and the interface will look clean and consistent. (After changing the font smoothing preferences, you must quit and relaunch your applications in order to see the effect.) — MacHome

• Office X crashed and now won't open. Microsoft said is a font problem.

Mac OS X looks in more than one place for fonts and you have to make sure that there are no duplications and no corrupted fonts. First check Library/Fonts/ which is the primary place for all users of Mac OS X. Then check the Users/<username>/Library/Fonts/ folder and also System/Library/Fonts/ folder. Mac OS X will also look in your System Folder/Fonts folder, the same as used in Mac OS 9. Remove duplicates to avoid crashes. Also there are three upgrades for Office v.X but you can download the combined updater (1.8MB) at www.microsoft.com/mac/DOWNLOAD/OFFICEX/CombUpd1003.asp

▶ I have a Power Mac 7300 with a 2G HD. I need a larger one. What do you recommend for an internal SCSI hard drive?

There are relatively few choices in new drives now in the modest size and 50 pin narrow SCSI connection needed. How about a 9GB 7200 RPM IBM UltraStar 2XP series 27H1714 drive, 1-inch-high with regular 50 pin connection for \$120? It's fast and quiet. I see it at www.compuVest.com You can make it your main drive and keep the 2GB drive, as there is space for two drives in the 7300 as long as you don't have the internal zip drive. Make sure vou have the SCSI address and termination jumpers set right. The better way to go larger than 9GB is to buy a PCI card like the Sonnet Tempo Ultra ATA 100 card \$100 that allows you to use the more common and cheaper-bythe-gigabyte EIDE drives, plus a EIDE drive. I see the 40GB 7200 RPM IBM DeskStar 60GXP Vancouver for \$68 at www.gogocity.com. The 80GB model is \$94. Either way, get product ID#MR-922-1124 hard drive carrier from MacResQ (\$20) to mount the drive.

► How about a CPU accelerator recommendation for the 7300?

I used to favor Newer Technology but they have not yet returned to business from selling what was left of their company. The talent moved to Sonnet Technology, so they seem to be the best now. They sell the Crescendo/PCI G3 and G4 upgrades. These fit in the processor slot like the 604 processor card

does. This makes upgrade and downgrade very easy. There are compromises due to the rest of the computer's speed, so don't expect a 400MHz G4 upgraded 7300 to work as fast as a real 400MHz Graphite G4. Also, you can't upgrade to Mac OS 9.2.2 without trouble and Mac OS X without even greater trouble. Still, you can buy a 450MHz G3 within a decent budget (\$150@MacZone) and have four times the speed. I would not spend more on pushing the 7300, rather, save your funds toward a G5 for next year or whenever your boosted 7300 doesn't "cut it" any longer. If you do choose to boost the 7300 and are running Mac OS 9.x, also consider the benefits of the ATI Radeon 7000 Mac Edition for \$120. It will help quite a lot in everything you do, not just to enable you to play 3D games. The 7300 has three PCI slots, between the ATA card and the video card, that should do nicely.

▶ I have a 500 MHz G4 with ATA CD recorder. I want to change that to a DVD recorder. Can I?

You can pull the Apple drive out and replace it with a Pioneer DVR-104 (\$349) mechanism like Apple uses now, or you can buy an external FireWire version (\$459). The internal one can use Apple's iDVD or DVD Studio Pro, but the external one cannot use iDVD. iDVD2 at only \$20 is much cheaper than DVD Studio Pro at \$1000. They both require *Mac OS X v10.1* or newer on a PowerMac G4 with AGP graphics. DVD Studio Pro 3 can also be used in *Mac OS 9.2.2*. I'm pretty sure the original iDVD works in *Mac OS 9* but I don't know where you can get it, except maybe from someone who already has a copy.recorder.

Image Transfer in a Snap in OS X:

Mac OS X's Image Capture application provides a simple, consistent method of download images from any digital camera. Plug a camera into your Mac, and the application automatically launches and asks what you'd like to do with the camera images. Most of the time, you'll simply want to download the images to your Pictures folder and delete the images from the camera. Image Capture actually offers a way to do these tasks automatically, without having to prompt you at all. Launch Image Capture and select Preferences from the Image Capture menu. Now click the Download Options tab at the top. Select: Delete items from camera after downloading, Now. under the Connection Options header, select Automatically download all items, and close the window.

The next time you connect your camera to your Mac, your pictures will be downloaded to your computer and deleted from your camera automatically. Then, visit your *Pictures* folder to view them.

Get Picture Modifications in

QuarkXPress 4.x: In the Get Picture dialog box, certain command key combinations, if held when clicking Open, change the nature of the imported picture: Shift - causes the screen preview of imported TIFFs to be generated at 36 dpi rather than the standard 72 dpi. The high resolution data in the original TIFF file is left unchanged, and that is what's used when outputting to a PostScript printer. Command - when applied to high resolution color bitmaps (TIFFs, etc), imports them as grayscale

instead of color. Command - when applied to highresolution grayscale bitmaps (TIFFs, etc), imports grayscale bitmans as black & white.
