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## April Meeting David Ross

April's presentation addressed a topic that should be important to every Mac user, and in fact to every computer user; back up. The first rule of computing is, "backup your data." The second rule is, don't forget rule number one. I don't often like to repeat things that have already been said over and over, but this one bares repeating: "It's not if your hard drive will fail, but when it will fail"

The presentation was broken up into five short segments. Each done by a different presenter relating his backup strategy. Geoff



Broadhurst (LIMac board member) was up first. He backs up his data only, onto a large USB flash drive. He pointed out how inexpensive these have become. You can fire up your browser, and check out any online, or brick and mortar retailer to see the prices. After copying his data to the flash drive, he stores it in his safe deposit box. (Many users

feel you should have an off-site backup.) The other part of his strategy, is to back up his entire hard drive onto an external one, using Time Machine. He does this at regular intervals.

Next George Canellis (LIMac VP) showed the various exter nal drives you might want to use. He started by showing a high end solution. This was a RAID setup, which can accommodate four drives (which must be installed in matched sets), working as RAID-0 (striped), RAID-1 (mirrored), or a combination of both. You can hot swop one drive for another. When connected to a Mac server this is suitable for backing up multiple computers on a network. George then showed the Newer Technology Voyager drive interface. This allows you to use any SATA drive by simply seating it into the interface. Once you copy data to the drive you should safely store it in an anti static bag. You can later plug the drive in, to access or retrieve any of the files stored on it. He also showed



After George, I was up (I am a LIMac Board Member as well) to show my strategy. The first method I showed was basic Drag and Drop backup. I have been doing this for years, from the time when there were only floppy disks. This is a simple and effective way to make sure you have a backup of every file you create. Immediately after creating your

file, you simply drag it to the backup location, and you are good to go. Once you get in the habit of doing this, you will do it all the time. To make it even simpler, you can avoid going to the location of the original file, and just drag the proxy icon to the backup location. You file will be copied to the new location. (See screenshot below of Proxy Icon.)



I then showed the steps to using *Carbon Copy Cloner* (donation ware). This application makes a bootable copy of your hard drive. You can deselect things you don't want to copy, and set it to either archive old files, or delete them to make your target drive identification.



cal to your source drive. There are also advanced settings you can experiment with. CCC can also be configured to backup automatically at intervals that you determine. Up next was Rick Matteson (LIMac Program Coordinator). Rick Talked about *SuperDuper!*, which is quite similar to *Carbon Copy Cloner* Unlike CCC you must purchase *SuperDuper!* for \$27.95. There is a trial version which has some limitation which are removed after purchase. *SuperDuper!* features Smart Update, which will update an already cloned drive, copying and overwriting only the things that have change since your last backup. He pointed out that *Carbon Copy Cloner* has a similar feature, called incremental backups! *SuperDuper!* like CCC, also allows you to copy only what you wish, and create scheduled backups. You might

want to try both, and then make a decision as to which you like better. Last up, was Victor Susman (New LIMac Board Member). Victor discussed three of the available online backup solutions. In addition he showed *Dropbox*, which is only a repository for a few gigabytes of files. He showed the differences between; Mozy, *CrashPlan*, and *Carbonite*. Mozy offers two options: *MozyHome*, and *MozyPro*. The plans they offer are not very flexible. Mozy Home comes in two flavors; 1 computer for \$5.99/month which gives you 50 GB of storage, or 3 computers for \$9.99/month, which gives you 125 GB of storage. Either plan allows you to buy extra storage at the rate of \$2.00 for each 20 GB. MozyPro, is for business use, and offers

more features, but it cost more per GB of storage. To learn more about Mozy go to: <a href="http://mozy.com/">http://mozy.com/</a>. Carbonite, and CrashPlan, each offer unlimited plans. With these you get a yearly plan. Carbonite's unlimited plans start at \$59.00/year, while CrashPlan's unlimited plans start at \$36.00/year. The features of each of these services are too lengthy to discuss in this article. ## **Bradley's Tech Session**

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▶ I have a question about the recent Flashback "virus" that's

everyone is talking about. Is there a fix from Apple and are there more to come?

First off it's not actually a virus, it is a trojan, still a form of malware. There are a few variants, the OSX.Flashback.A, OSX. Flashback.B, C, I and K. What happens is you go to some web site, mostly likely something illegal or out of the country, and up pops a dialog box offering a bogus Adobe Flash Player plug-in update, you click to download it, and it is in fact this trojan. Dr. Web, a Russian antivirus vendor, reports that the infected websites listed by the company are mainly in the .nu domain (assigned to the island state of Niue), ranging from URLs related to movies and TV streaming services to a domain called Gangstasparadise. I've read that a large number of WordPress based blogging sites became infected when they installed the ToolsPack utility plugin.

What the code does is open a back door to your computer and attempts to harvest web browsing activity, usernames and passwords. It then sends that information to its network of computers in Russia. For starters, people running Mac OS X 10.6.8 or 10.7.3 with the latest Apple supplied Java and security updates, are immune from this. More than 20% of Macs still run 10.4.x and 10.5.x, so Apple offers no Java update for them. Anybody running something older than 10.6 are not eligible

for the current flash player 11.2 releases. They also need an Intel processor. If you get a Flash update notice, don't take it. Go to Adobe and get the latest release on your own.

Anyway, the new Flashback trojan uses a vulnerability in the older Java implementation on Mac OS X to install it's payload silently, without you entering your password, unless it detects either Intego's VirusBarrier X6 or the free iAntiVirus or ClamXav, or Little Snitch, HTTP Scoop or Packet Peeper or Apple's XCode. In any of these cases, it would delete itself. In fact all you need to fake it out, is to create a folder called 'Little Snitch' in your /Library folder to insulate yourself, you don't need to pay for Little Snitch or install any code. Some people have suggested turning off java, but many popular applications use it to some extent. Most notable in my mind is the Adobe Creative Suite. Apple does not include Java with Mac OS X 10.7. There is a separate download of the Java Runtime Environment. It should be noted that Oracle who now develops java, patched this vulnerability in February, Apple did not update the Mac OS X release until this trojan came out and all the bad press about 600,000 infected Macs. Back in November of 2010, Apple stopped their in-house development of Java SE6 for Mac and handed over the work to Oracle after they acquired Sun Microsystems who developed Java in the first place. At the time, Apple suggested to developers to phase out their use of

Java. Oracle has not finished the Mac OS X port of JDK 7u4 as of March 7, 2012. One of the first web sites to publish information about the Flashback trojan is F-Secure. They offer a free detection and removal app.

I've been reading about another trojan making the rounds lately. OSX/Sabpab-A tends to hide in a malformed Microsoft Word file about Human Rights abuses in Tibet by the Chinese. Microsoft patched this vulnerability in the 11.5.5 update for Office 2004 and 12.1.9 for Office 2008 (both updates published way back in June 2009). Office 2011 is immune. By the way, this vulnerability only applied to the old .doc format. Office 2008 and newer style .docx files are not vulnerable. It pays to run the Microsoft Auto Update application. There is a free app to fight this trojan too. I use the free Sophos Anti-Virus for Mac Home Edition and ClamXav and Little Snitch. Sophos catches this Word based trojan as well.

Anyway, Apple offers a removal tool for Lion users only. See <a href="http://support.apple">http://support.apple</a>. com/kb/DL1517. Norton by Symantec has a free detection and removal tool as well. You can bet there will be more in the future and Apple will have a tough time keeping up. Any success of a trojan on the Mac will encourage others to make more. It's important to keep up-to-date and be extra vigilant if you visit shady web sites. Some folks turn off all automatic updates, so they never get the updates needed to protect their computer. Still reports are, as I write this, that the number of reported infected Macs has dropped from 600,000 to 30,000. It's difficult to be sure, as some Macs may be infected, but are not

reporting back to the command and control servers because of DNS redirection. Perhaps this is the tipping point or the "wake-up call" for Mac users to finally install antivirus software on their systems. The next one might be more malicious and not just snoop your passwords. This also shows that Apple only supports one generation behind the current release. Macs running 10.5.8 or older are left out in the cold and have to fend for themselves.

- ▶ I have a iMac running Mac OS X 10.6.8 and it has a 320GB internal hard drive. I have 39MB left and that runs down to zero as I run applications. I get a dialog box saying I've run out of memory and I need to quit applications. I've done that and thrown some things out to free up some space. It's been this way for a week or two. The iMac has 4GB of RAM. What can I do?
- Clearly the 4GB of RAM is not enough to run the operating system and the selection of simulataneous applications you are trying to run. When you run out of memory, the Mac will use virtual memory more. It always uses some virtual memory, at least equal to the amount of real memory you have installed. If you double the installed memory to 8GB, then you would need virtual memory less and the Mac will run much better, but the disk space needs would be worse when you are so tight. The Mac gets a bit crazy when you have only 10% free space and you have next to none at 39MB. If you meant 39GB, then you are getting close. I'd suggest going to the System Profiler, look at the second line in the Hardware Overview for your model identifier, probably something like

iMac7,1. With a 320GB HD, that sounds like Mid 2007 to Early 2009. Then go to http://eshop.macsales.com/shop/apple/ memory/iMac and find your model iMac. Apple only offered up to 4GB on the 2007 and 2008 models, when they could actually use 6GB. You could replace a 2GB module and use a 4GB SO-DIMM. Yes that would be a unmatched set, but the slim speed disadvantage is offset greatly by having 50% more memory. Then, I'd go for a bigger internal hard drive as well as a matched or larger still external FireWire backup drive. Normally I go four times larger each time I upgrade, but they don't have 1.5 TB drives anymore, so I'd suggest a Hitachi Deskstar 2TB 7200rpm model. \$160 at newegg.com. ifixit.com has instructions and sells the tools needed to do the upgrade yourself. The RAM install is very easy, with a small access panel on the bottom, just a few captive screws. The hard drive upgrade is pretty involved, most end-users would shy away from doing it. The new metal and glass design involves using strong suction cups to pull the glass off the magnets that holds it's frame in place. ifixit also sells what they call the Universal Drive Adapter, which allows you to connect the bare new SATA hard drive to the iMac via USB to (Carbon Copy) clone everything from the current internal drive to it before swapping in the now bootable drive with all your files. The 2TB external is \$240 at OWC. You could avoid the hassle of replacing the internal hard drive by just using the external drive for data and leaving the small internal drive for the system and applications. What you might do is copy your home folder to the external drive, then use the

System Preferences - Accounts, unlock and then right-click or control-click on your admin account to get the Advanced Options... pop-up menu item. There you can use the Choose... button to show the Mac where your home folder is now, on the external drive. Then reboot, make sure the home folder is in fact on the external drive, then you can delete the copy on the internal drive, freeing up a ton of disk space needed for temporary files and virtual memory. This will work slower, as FireWire drives tend to be slower than internal SATA drives, but this compromise is very easy to do. Your internal hard drive was getting much slower once it was past 2/3 full. Besides FireWire hard drives with 2TB or larger partitions run slower than they should due to a bug in Apple's FireWire implementation. Saving money on the old iMac now might be a good idea if you are saving for a new Ivy Bridge powered model this summer.

- ▶ I'm using a Logitech Wireless Keyboard K350. It's not really designed for the Mac but I like the 'Comfort Wave Design'? The only real problem I have is the windows key and the alt key are in the reverse positions relative to the command key and the option key they are treated as. Is there any way to fix that?
- Mac OS X 10.5 and newer have a function in the Keyboard System Preference panel, Keyboard tab. There is a Modifier Keys... button there where you can change the Option  $(\nabla)$  Key and the Command  $(\mathbb{H})$  Key. You may have to disconnect the USB wireless receiver after bringing up this window to make it stick. You may have to

use a direct connected USB mouse for this step. For just this function, there is the free *Consistent Keyboards*. There is also the more comprehensive and free *KeyRemap4MacBook*.

- ▶ Recently my Mac running Mac OS X 10.4, when I first start it up, if I start to type, the letters are delayed. The problem goes away after it's warmed up a bit. Why is that?
- I'm pretty sure it's not literally a case of warming up. I'm guessing your computer is running something at startup and you can't hear the hard drive working. Check your System Preferences - Accounts - Login Items to see what is set to run at startup. Check the activity monitor to see what is running. It's not just CPU usage, but disk access, which Activity Monitor does not show what is causing the disk activity. Make sure the pop-up menu shows all processes, not just my processes. I imagine when you see what is running and using up substantial CPU percentages, you can remove the offending LaunchAgent, LaunchDaemon or StartupItem. Make sure the pop-up menu shows all processes, not just my processes. I'd check the various logs in Console to see if there are any errors shown. Keep in mind, the Mac loads fonts, turns on File and Printer Sharing at startup and a whole host of possible things you added, so it could take a while for that to sort out. Turning on FileVault will slow the machine down quite a bit. Quite a few programs check the Internet

for new versions of themselves, and that includes background applications you have installed. Some of these don't show an icon in the dock, maybe just a new menu extra. If you have *iTunes* open at startup, it could be sharing your library and that takes time too. If you have Mail running at startup, then it has to check all your accounts for new messages and download them. I think most of our members can relate. When their Mac was new, it booted up pretty quickly, but now it takes longer because of all the stuff we've added over the years. You could also try as a experiment, booting up with the shift key held down until you get the login window showing SAFE BOOT. That temporarily kills various startup programs. It could be something normal and required, like Spotlight, which shows up as the mdworker process. On my own machine, it's set to backup at 9:30 PM each night. If it doesn't backup then, it tries to backup when I startup the next time, which would slow down my computer like you describe. You could also have directory damage, or a very full hard drive, which would cause a slowdown as the Mac tries to deal with the problem. Check into that with Disk Utility and run a Verify Disk test. You might try using the free OnyX to clear the user and system caches.

- ▶ I see a lot of advertisement for *MacKeeper*. Do you recommend that?
- No. And they try too hard pushing their lame software. It's almost as bad as a trojan.
- ▶ I was using Bullstorm's *Keyword Manager* with *iPhoto* 8, part of iLife '09. Then I updated to iLife '11 and it is not compatible. That's OK, as the new *iPhoto* has it's

## own keyword manager. I keep getting a warning it's incompatible and suggests I remove it. How?

■ The easiest way is to use the installer program for Keyword Manager as it also offers to remove the plug in. If you no longer have it, then you can remove it manually. Go to your home folder/Library/ Application Support/SIMBL/Plugins/ and delete the KeywordManagerPlugin. bundle file. By the way, they have given up trying to make a version for *iPhoto* 9.1.2 or newer. iPhoto is now up to 9.2.3. Many installers offer a removal option as well, so keep that in mind for the next time you want to get rid of something you installed. Some installers put the program inside a folder in the /Applications folder and in there you may find a uninstaller. Adobe creates a Adobe Installers folder inside the Utilities sub-folder and in there you will find uninstallers for Creative Suites and Photoshop Elements(s). Microsoft offers no uninstaller for Office 2011 like they had for 2008 or 2004, but I found a uninstall package that does the otherwise manual work for you. Some program installers leave behind an install log text file which can help you find the assorted files that got installed besides the application. Sometimes I've found what to remove by checking the manufacturer's web site blog or forum for a posting on the subject of removal. I use the program Clean App from Synium which logs what gets installed and offers to delete the related files if I delete

the application by itself. It's also great for visualizing my disk usage to target something taking up a lot of disk space.

- ▶ I have a MacBook Pro and I want to put my iTunes on my Samsung television. This model supports the AllShare software, but that's only for Windows. I went to the Apple Store and they suggested I buy the Apple TV for \$99.
- I have a Panasonic TV with DLNA support, so I added a USB to WiFi adapter and downloaded on my Mac the free TVMOBiLi media server software. As AllShare is just Samsung's name for DLNA compatible devices, so it should work for you too. *TVMOBiLi* is fully integrated with *iTunes*. Your iTunes catalogue is made instantly available as soon as you install TVMOBiLi onto your computer.

Check it out at <a href="http://www.tvmobili.com/download.php">http://www.tvmobili.com/download.php</a> There may be other DLNA server software out there, but I stopped looking when I found one that works and it's free. The Apple TV works too, but I found the compatible WiFi adapter for under \$15 so I had to try it out, even if I never really use it. Of course if you have your iTunes collection on a iPod or iPhone or iPad, you can use that, directly connected to a audio input on the TV. Apple's Universal Dock with remote makes this easy, just add the audio cables. You can just plug right into the headphone jack if you don't want the dock.
