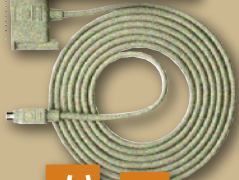
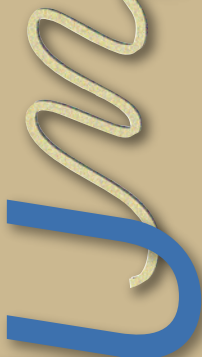

Among other impressive things, she is the chairperson of the Digital Photography Department at the School of Visual Arts (132 West 21st Street New York, NY). In addition to having a wealth of knowledge about the software, and the art of digital photography, Katrin is also very clever and humorous. The first product Katrin demonstrated was *Adobe Photoshop Lightroom 2*. This product is made for photographers. ▶ **I have two Apple Airport Express base stations, one with the printer and one to the home stereo. The printer is slow and sometimes grinds to a halt. Is there a reason that happens?**

■ I would imagine first that the signal strength to that base station is low. When the signal is weak, the throughput is low. Compounding this can be interference from other wireless networks, microwave ovens in the signal path and 2.4GHz cordless telephones, whether or not they are in active use or not. That's besides the usual signal drop-offs due to distance and the 25% signal attenuation through any typical wood and sheetrock wall. Concrete, plaster and chicken-wire and steel beams are worse. Add to that the generally sub-standard performance of Apple's small base station and the fact that printing involves a tremendous amount of data to be sent to a typical QuickDraw inkjet (or even laser) printer. Postscript printers tend to require far less for your typical textual pages. On top of all that, there is the bi-directional nature of a printer, which must periodically report back in a timely fashion it's progress and any error conditions like a paper jam, out of paper or low ink. By the way, the Airport Express was recently upgraded to 802.11n which greatly enhanced it's range and speed if it can communicate with another Apple Airport base station, ideally the Airport Extreme or Time Capsule. Besides all that hassle, not every USB printer and it's driver is all that compatible with the technology. Considering Apple's list price is \$99 for the Airport Express, if you must go wireless printing, consider instead a fairly speedy HP Deskjet 6940 Printer offering up to 36 ppm black printing (you'll never get that, but just for comparison purposes) It has a Ethernet jack so you can plug into your wireless router and wired or wirelessly print to it from all your Macs and (heaven forbid) Windows machines without any hassles. At 1200 dpi printing, text will be sharp, but it has 6 colors, for a superior color range. It's only \$43.41 at buy.com, If you really need a printer stuck in a remote corner,

so you can't run a Ethernet cable to it, but still want wireless printing, then you can drive to your local OfficeMax and get the HP Deskjet 6988 which has wireless 802.11g built-in besides the Ethernet port for just \$89.99. Also rated a 36 ppm max in black at 1200 dpi, this bargain wireless printer uses one tri-color ink cartridge as well as a black one. Personally I don't like suggesting printers with the tri-color ink carts, so for this class printer, HP offers the Photosmart D7460, which at \$110 street price (newegg.com) is admittedly a tad more than just the \$100 Airport Express. It is rather cool, 34 ppm max black at 1200 dpi and 6 individual inks, touch screen 3.5" LCD display, memory card slots, WiFi printing. These HP printers don't suffer the clogged print heads that the Epson models do. By the way, none of these HP printers are sold at your local Apple Store so they won't be telling you about these worthwhile bargain problem solvers for the home network. FYI, that Deskjet 6940 and Photosmart D7460 are directly supported by Leopard's included printer drivers. Canon models also don't clog up much, but they don't have many network capable models. There is the new wired/wireless Pixma MP620 all-in-one that is worth a look. It's 4+1 colors with a 2.5" screen which goes for \$115.63 on buy.com and the Apple Store has it too.



► **I have a problem with iChat on my FiOS connection. The video freezes and sometimes the audio as well. I'm not on a wireless connection. Can you suggest something that will help?**

■ FiOS is a fast network but it also has a high latency. First off make sure Internet Sharing is turned off in your Sharing System Preference panel. Then we have to address two areas where the system's speed needs to be capped to avoid problems with their system. First off, quit iChat if it's now running, then in the System Preferences, QuickTime, Streaming tab, make sure the Streaming Speed is limited to 1.5 Mbps TI/Intranet/LAN. Then go back to iChat, go to the iChat menu, select Preferences..., click on Audio/Video category, then change the

Bandwidth Limit to 500 kbps. You can experiment with different settings in iChat but any change in the Streaming speed will not be seen unless iChat is not running when you make the change. iChat cannot cope with magnified speed changes possible with the FiOS system. Also I would first use the shareware *Cocktail* (Click on Network category icon and Optimization tab) to change your connection type to 'Fiber (FiOS)' to allow the system to change network parameters to better handle the speed and latency of the FiOS system. After applying this change, you would need to restart the Mac to take advantage of it. The free version will allow you to do this kind of change, but I recommend paying for the software for it's other features.

► **Can a web server see what cookies are on your computer as they deposit new cookies?**

■ Not with a modern web browser. That was a potential problem many years ago. The browser only allows that domain's web server (or server farm for busy web sites) to access the cookie data it put there. The cookie contents are just site specific data, no executable code is there. Besides, cookies usually are set to expire after some preset amount of time to be extra safe. Cookie data is usually the last thing you have to worry about security-wise. There is a chance the cookie data could go bad, so you may have to find the domain in question within the browser's preference and delete the cookie entries for that web site, but that should be rather rare and not such a big deal. The only problem would be remembering the password for the web site, which now wouldn't automatically log you in. In fact, many web sites require cookies, including our user group web site's bulletin board.

► **My wife has the first of the modern looking 20" Intel iMac models which came with 1GB of memory. Everything is fine except one file she downloaded and had to work on in Pages. With this one file in Pages, when she types something, there is a delay. What do you suggest?**

■ I'd be a sport and upgrade her RAM. This project is no doubt more complicated than the rest and is taxing the limits of what fits into only 1GB of RAM. If you upgraded the iMac from Tiger (which it shipped with) to Leopard, then that 1GB

goes even less far. The mid 2007 came with 1GB of memory in one of it's two memory slots. You can increase the RAM capacity and speed by allowing the computer to access it's main memory at 128 bits wide. If you buy just a second 1GB module, which might just be enough for the problem at hand, it's just \$18.49 for top quality RAM. You could of course max out the iMac with 4GB for a whopping \$73.49 (newegg.com price for Kingston (not valueRAM memory) Note the sarcasm in that last sentence.

► **I use Apple's Mail as my email client for three different accounts. One is Gmail, and on that one account, I realized it wasn't downloading all my mail. A found a bunch of email in the inbox when I went online. I configured Gmail for POP access. What settings do you suggest I look into?**

■ First I'd say I do almost the same thing and also found a mail I didn't receive in *Microsoft Entourage* when I checked via the web site. Of course there is a automatic spam filtering at Google, so some e-mail may not be forwarded to *Mail* because it was set aside by Google. I would also check my account settings in *Mail's* preferences. Click on the POP account for your gmail and click on the Mailbox Behaviors tab, make sure under Trash you have the checkbox checked to Move deleted messages to a separate folder and erase deleted messages when quitting Mail. Under the Advanced tab, make sure the three checkboxes are checked and for remove copy from server after retrieving a message is set for 'Right away' and there is nothing in the edit field for 'Prompt me to skip messages over ____ KB' otherwise you could have left some larger messages on the server. That option is popular for people on a slow Internet connection and they don't want to wait for all the e-mail to show up, just the jist of the plain messages and it would hold the big ones with attachments or complex HTML emails. They can then choose to download the complete mail item later or delete it. If your Mac's settings are OK, try going to the web site and setting Gmail for IMAP access which leaves the mail on the server intentionally and Mail would just be peeking at it, maybe deleting what you don't want. This option is preferable when you may be checking the mail from multiple computers. Of course you would have to create a new account in *Mail*

for the IMAP access to the Gmail account. See <http://mail.google.com/support/bin/answer.py?answer=81379> for help configuring Leopard's *Mail*.

► **I'm getting "Unable to complete backup. An error occurred while copying files to the backup volume." Error message from *Time Machine* when it fails to back up. I tried deleting the .plist file and erasing the *Time Machine* backup drive and it backs up just a tiny bit and fails. How can I fix this?**

■ First thing would be to try repairing permissions with *Disk Utility*. Then the problem is probably some screwed up file or files buried somewhere in your hard drive and *Time Machine* gives you no details. Go to your Utilities folder and start up *Terminal* and copy and paste in (or type in) this command without the quote marks: "sudo grep backupd /var/log/system.log". Enter your password at the prompt when prompted. You will get quite a bit of stuff on screen, but near the bottom you should see a path to the offending file which *Time Machine* is getting stuck at. It's actually pointing to the package contents where the file should go in the backup, but you can easily recognize the path back to your hard drive's subfolders and delete or archive the offending file. Then go to the *Time Machine* menu and start Backing up now and it should proceed. If *Time Machine* fails again, then paste in the command again, look again for the next bad file and get rid of it. My hard drives have millions of files, some dating back past the nineties and some files where apparently messed up and *Time Machine*, particularly since the Mac OS 10.5.2 update, is rather particular. Of course this failure to backup could be more serious. Depending on the age of your hard drives, both the main one(s) and the backup drive, you could have bad blocks, in which case you may see I/O errors. I've seen flaky FireWire ports cause these kinds of problems too. That can be worse. If you suspect your FireWire port is messed up, shut everything off and pull the power cord for about 15 minutes and then power up all peripherals and then plug the Mac back in and turn it on. That should reset them. This procedure may not help. I've seen bad drivers fixed by doing a combo Mac OS X update and not relying on the delta update offered by the *Software Update* (System/Library/CoreServices) application. ↗

Lightroom enables the photographer to do three essential things:

- Organize files
- Process (you might say edit) files
- Show your work to other people.

The organization process (called Library) allows you to embed metadata and keywords to individual files. This makes the process of searching for a photo with specific characteristics a lot easier. It also allows you to easily compare photos with similar characteristics. You can also embed your copywrite (if you have one) to the files. Katrin also demonstrated how this could help you to find and flag your best shot of a particular subject.

Next Katrin spoke about the editing process, which is designated as "Develop" in *Lightroom*. She actually started this segment by explaining the difference between "Raw", and the more common "JPEG" file format. Katrin made clear the limitations of working with JPEG, vs. the almost unlimited changes you can make to a Raw file. She explained the reason for this is that the Raw file contains all of the data, and the JPEG is a sort of precooked (pre processed) file. Katrin also stressed that all editing within *Lightroom* is non-destructive. The changes don't become permanent until you export your file. Of course, even then you can return to your original, and create a new file.

Among the editing techniques demonstrated were: white balance, exposure, color correction, and cropping. One really interesting feature, is that you can sync your white balance to all of the other photographs taken in the same session. Experienced *Photoshop* users, know that changes done during editing should be done in a particular order to achieve optimum results. Well, Katrin informed us that this is not a concern when using *Lightroom*. Once you export your photo, *Lightroom* will do that work for you, and apply the changes in the correct order. The two final editing tools demonstrated are quite useful, and generated a lot of enthusiasm from the experienced photographers in the group. The first is the spotting tool. It can remove marks left by dust on the sensor. Once you do it on one photo from a session, you can, as with the white balance, use it to remove those spots from all other photos taken in that session. Next Katrin showed the selective change tool. As its name suggests, you can use it to make adjustments only to the selected area.

Once all of the editing (developing) is done, you can share

your photographs in any (or all if you like) of the three following ways:

- Make a slide show
- Print your photos
- Post them to the web



After the *Lightroom* presentation, Katrin briefly demonstrated some of the new features in the newly released (at the time it was not yet released) *Photoshop CS4*. In the new release you can use *Bridge CS4*, to preview a picture by selecting it and hitting the space bar. Additionally, you can select several pictures, and preview them simultaneously. Another really impressive feature, is "content aware scaling"; this allows you to scale without distorting the image. Lastly, you can now very easily take slices of several photos, and put them together as one image. You could have done this with older versions, but it would have involved a great deal of *Photoshop* gymnastics. As with many presentations, you would have had to be there to get the full impact. Everyone really enjoyed this one, and we would really like to see her return to show us more about these creativity applications, and what they can really do. In short, *This Lady Rocks!* 🎸
