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July's Meeting

All eyes, and ears, were giving Benjamin Waldie their full attention, on Friday, July 11. Everyone was fascinated to see what can be done using AppleScript. This powerful programming tool, is installed with the System onto every Macintosh computer, and uses what are basically English language commands. Benjamin made us aware that some of the largest companies including: Hallmark, Showtime Networks, Sony, and TV Guide, use AppleScript for creating automated workflows (which is also the name of Mr. Waldie's company). Benjamin explained some of benefits of AppleScript as follows: faster, fewer mistakes, unattended operation, and expanding application features.

Mr. Waldie went on to explain which applications were scriptable, and which were recordable. A scriptable application must have an AppleScript dictionary – found by dragging the applications icon onto script editor. In a scriptable application you must create the script for the task you want performed. In a recordable application such as Mac OS 9.x, you just start recording, perform your task, and a script will be created. Then name and save the script.

Benjamin wrapped up the presentation by explaining how to get started with AppleScript. Two Web sites that are especially helpful are: www.applescript.com, and www.macscripter.net. We also learned that we did not have to write our own scripts many come included with the MAC OS and many more are available for download.

Everyone agreed this was a great presentation and that Benjamin Waldie should return in the future to show more about what AppleScript can do. 🞙

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TidBITS Troubleshooting Primer, Part 1

It's important to determine if the problem is reproducible or intermittent. Although an intermittent problem may be less irksome than a reproducible problem if you can keep working through it, intermittent problems are much harder to track down, because one of the variables involved is related to a time- or state-

related fact. Reproducible problems almost beg to be solved, because you can't keep working until you've solved the problem.

Pay attention to any visible indicators that might give more information about the problem. For instance, many devices have status LEDs that indicate whether a device is turned on and if it's performing some sort of activity. If those LEDs aren't working the way you expect, record that information.

Break the System Apart Once you have a firm grasp on the problem, you need to start breaking the system related to the problem into discrete steps or pieces. Then you can start analyzing different parts of the whole. The hard part here is that you may not realize what the different parts of the system are, making it difficult to understand how one could fail. But if you think about what's involved in using the system, you should be able to determine most

of the parts.

For instance, take the example of a wireless network that also has one computer connected via an *Ethernet* cable. In this sample network, the one wired computer is used as an informal file server. You're using one of the wireless computers, and you suddenly can't connect to a shared folder that's worked fine before. What are the pieces of this system? Let's determine what must be true for the situation to work

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Open multiple sites with Safari tabs:

To open a Web page in a new tab, you simply hold down the Command key as you click on a link or bookmark. The new page appears in the same window as the original, but in a tabbed interface. As an added benefit, you can open multiple Web sites in a single click, all in their own tabs. Here's how.

Create a bookmark folder that contains the Web sites you want to launch simultaneously. Then, hold down the *Command* key as you select the folder. When you do, *Safari* creates a tab for each of the bookmarks and loads the respective Web site in the tab.

Bradley's Tech Session

▶ My 2-year-old Epson Stylus Photo 870 needs repair. Should I invest \$75-\$100 to have it fixed or should I buy a newer, better model? Anything comparable wold be OK. The Stylus Photo series starts at the Photo

The Stylus Photo series starts at the Photo 820 at about \$76, but for a more comparable model, you can check out the \$149 Photo 825, particularly if you use a digital camera since it has a slot and adapters for memory cards. With the optional \$50 preview monitor, you can even print your digital pictures without the computer. If direct photo printing is not important then consider the \$190 Photo 900 which can print directly onto inkjet printable white CD-Rs or DVD-Rs. The straight paper path is also perfect for printing on heavy stock like poster board, up to 1.3mm thick. It also supports a high capacity color ink cartridge which better supports the 4-inch-wide (or 8.3" wide) paper roll. Epson's offering a \$30 rebate when you buy the SP900 with a 30-pack of Memorex printable CD-Rs. The new models support BorderFree[™] printing which avoids the always annoying large bottom margin. You could take advantage of the opportunity to supersize to the 13"x19"-capable Stylus Photo 1280. It's now down to \$377 after rebate. The models work with ColorLife[™] Photo paper for up to 27 year fade resistance. One of the biggest factors to consider when a piece of equipment fails is how long you can be without it. It may make better business sense to replace than repair for stuff that does not cost that much, relative to the repair costs. Also consider that as time goes by, software support for older models becomes spotty and low priority, so clinging to an old model will catch up to you in the long run. As we move forward to Mac OS 10.3, who knows if the discontinued models will be as well supported.

For flexibility and price, the new Stylus Photo 900 is a great printer and my recommendation.

▶ I have a dual 533MHz G4 and I've tried *Mac OS 10.1.3*, although I usually run *Mac OS 9.2.2*. When I ran *Norton Disk Doctor*, it said I had a major problem of more than one system folder.

The major problem is you have an old version of *Norton Utilities*, which doesn't realize that this is OK, as one is *Mac OS 9* and one is *Mac*

IIPS:

Be a *Photoshop* expert:

Becoming an expert in *Photoshop* is pretty difficult to do. But it's even harder to maintain that guru status since the product is constantly changing.

Fortunately, Adobe feels your pain and has created a special place on their Web site to help you out. The Adobe Photoshop Expert Center includes a slew of tutorials. tips, downloadable goodies, and plug-in information to make sure you're always up on things. The free service, which requires a valid Photoshop serial number, is available at www.adobe.com/ expertcenter/ photoshop/ login.html.

properly, after which we can analyze each of the components.

- On your computer, you need properly installed file sharing client software.
- ► Your computer must have a working connection to the wireless access point.
- ► The access point must allow you to see a computer connected via wired Ethernet.
- ► The wired Ethernet computer must have a working connection to the access point.
- ► File sharing server software must be running on the wired Ethernet computer.
- ► A folder must explicitly be shared on the wired Ethernet computer.

You could certainly break these pieces into even smaller pieces, but this should be sufficient to get started.

Keep in mind that what I've just described is only one working system, which is important, because if there are other working systems other wireless computers that can see the file server – that can help you zoom in on the problem quickly.

Make sure to check off each question you answer in your notebook, and note any interesting things that happen when you perform the test. I don't suggest you do this because you're going to forget what you've done while you're troubleshooting, but because you may have forgotten by the next time the problem happens.

Plus, if you end up wanting to ask someone else for help, you can say authoritatively that you had indeed tried some test with negative results.

In most situations, the solution to your problem will make itself clear during this process of answering questions. Perhaps it's summer, and the reinstallation of your screen door is blocking the Wi-Fi signal. (Continued in the next FORUM)

slashes in Mac OS X "Farlier this week we noted that forward slashes should never be used in the name of a drive or partition, or virtually in any other name field in Mac OS X. The reason behind this limitation stems from Mac OS X's **UNIX** underpinnings In prior versions of Mac OS the location of a file was noted using a path, with the colon (:) separating objects. Mac OS X uses the forward slash (/) in place of the colon.

OS 10. The latest release, which requires Mac OS 10.1.5 or newer understands this situation and will not alert you to this normal condition. Also you will find that many modern Mac OS 10 programs require Mac OS 10.2 to operate, as Apple made major improvements from 10.1. If you only are trying out Mac OS 10 now, rather than installing Mac OS 10.2 and updating to 10.2.6, maybe you can wait a few months and upgrade to "Panther" Mac OS 10.3. You should at least let the Software Update System Preference update you to 10.1.5 and any other pertinent items. Mac OS 10.2 is faster than 10.1, but perhaps not as responsive as OS 9, but 10.3 will be much faster than 10.2. If you happen to have a model with the ATI Rage 128 Pro AGP video card, that does not support Quartz Extreme which also will limit your responsiveness under the newer Mac OS 10.2 or newer systems. You can replace your video card with the Radeon 8500 Mac Edition for better performance and second monitor support. 3D games will see a great improvement. It's cheaper to buy the *Panther* upgrade though. ▶ I have a beige G3, and I installed a SIIG

brand USB card (PCI) and I'm having trouble getting things into the computer. Main problem right now is a Canon scanner, but the budget is tight. Many products won't work with a USB card. Not just SIIG's card or Belkin or even Keyspan's card. Only built-in USB is acceptable. One of my clients bought a Nikon Coolpix camera, which would not work with her USB card. She failed to notice the system requirements for built-in USB, or she figured a USB card would be acceptable. WRONG! If you read the System Requirements on Canon's Web site, they clearly say "... USB port (excludes add-on board)" I've seen plenty of printers work with a USB card, and various mice, trackballs or graphics tablets, but digital cameras and scanner are more particular. There is no alternate software that will make it work. The only solution is to sell the beige G3 and buy something newer. Panther won't work at all on the beige G3 and Jaguar doesn't support the floppy drive or the built-in video accelerator. Beige is dead. \$350 gets you a used blue and white G3, more money gets you a

better Mac; \$680 gets you a G4. If you want to

use modern peripherals, a more modern Mac is required. If you want to move up, check out www.powermax.com/home/tradein.html. Small Dog Electronics has used 266MHz iMacs for \$349 – plus \$39 shipping.

Work efficiently by using folder aliases:

If you routinely have to navigate from one folder to another, try including an alias of the folder in the main folder. That way, you simply double-click on the alias to move to the other folder. You can also make aliases of various folders and keep them on your desktop to make drag-anddrop copying easier. To make an alias of a folder, simply select it and choose File > Make Alias. Your Mac then displays a duplicate of the folder, along with a marker that indicates it's an alias of a real folder

Too Many CDs?

Sooner or later, you will find yourself with way too many CDs to keep track of. Some of the CDs you have may be old software that you no longer use but do not want to throw out.

A good way to keep a lot of CDs you do not need to use often is to stack them inside an empty cakebox CD-R container (that's the 50-pack CD-Rs come in). It won't make it easier to find a particular disc, but you can sure stack a lot of them neatly in a small space. -The Finder. Kennewick, WA
