comes with Apple Remote Desktop client

built-in. It must be enabled in your System Preferences – Sharing in order to be controlled remotely. It must be enabled in order to be able to control that Mac remotely. In order to control a Mac or any supported computer (you can control Mac, Windows, Linux, and UNIX systems), you need the Apple Remote Desktop 3 management software. It comes in two versions, a 10 Managed Systems edition: \$299/administrator, and an Unlimited Managed Systems edition: \$499. Apple actually calls it managing, rather than controlling remote computers, but essentially it is the same thing.

Victor first showed a QuickTime movie that demonstrated someone controlling (actually it was of Victor himself) a Mac remotely. He was in Italy control-

▶ My daughter just got a MacBook Pro yesterday, an upgrade from a old PowerBook

running Tiger. Can she use the Migration Assistant to copy virtually everything from the old PowerBook or not?

Yes (as long as the PowerBook was running some version of Mac OS X 10.1 or newer and the old PowerBook wasn't so old it lacks a FireWire port and) of course you will need a 6-pin to



6-pin FireWire cable to do so, which is the normal style used to connect eternal hard drives, not the 6-pin to 4-pin style used for digital camcorders. If you don't have one, they are sold a the Apple Store and at MicroCenter.

You have two types of issues with this transition, the upgrade to Leopard and the switch to Intel, both of which will need upgrades for.

Of course I would take a few precautions first with the PowerBook. The Migration Assistant would copy all the login items/Startup Items from the old Mac OS X to the new, but if they are old and would be incompatible with Leopard and the new Intel processor, that would cause the new Mac to lock up just as it tries to start up. You also have to watch out for kernel extensions that are out of date that don't work in Leopard.

A lot of people used *Norton Utilities* which won't work in Leopard, so I would download and run the *Remove-SymantecMacFiles.command* script to get rid of that. And old version of *Application Enhancer* System Preference panel would also cause Leopard to lock up at startup. I would take a screen shot of the list of login items, on the PowerBook and remove any non-Apple items. Then after you migrate, any old applications that are incompatible can be deleted and replaced with new versions that are compatible.

The old Applications (Mac OS 9) and System Folder folders can be deleted as they aren't supported by Leopard nor the Intel processor unless you are going to try *SheepSaver*. You may want to run the *System Profiler*, click on Software-Applications

ling his office Mac in the USA. Just a side note, he made this movie using Ambrosia Software's Snapz Pro X (http://www. AmbrosiaSW.com/utilities/snapzprox/). He then showed how



you could open files, edit them, save and print. The remote user is controlling all of this, and it is taking place on the computer the user is controlling. Victor

also stressed that you might want to use this on a computer that is in the room with you, or even right beside you. Why you ask, well, you can run applications that are not on your computer, but on the other one, without switching computers.

Victor explained it is relatively easy to set up this application unless you are dealing with a network. In that case, you will probably need to get a network specialist from the Apple Store to help you. The system requirements for *Apple Remote Desktop 3* are pretty light. You need only a computer running OS 10.3.9 or above. To take advantage of all the features you will need OS 10.4.x. Anyone who must travel, yet needs to access a home or office computer, will find this application very valuable, if not indispensable. to get a list of all your applications. Open wide the window and look in the last column (Kind) which shows which a PowerPC, which Universal Binary and what are Intel only. It is in your best interest to replace as much of the PowerPC applications with newer versions that are better suited to the Intel processor. Some applications out there come in a PowerPC and a Intel version, not Universal Binary.

A good example is *Adobe Reader* 8.1.2 and the newer 9.0. Even if you had the most recent version by number, you want to download and replace with the Intel native version. In the case of a program like this, the application's icon would be shown with a circle and a slash superimposed to show it can be run on this computer. If you were making do with *Microsoft Office X* under Tiger, that won't work in Leopard. *Office 2004* would work but it's not Universal Binary for Intel.

If you were using Adobe Photoshop Elements 4, that will have to go in favor of Elements 6, as that is needed for Leopard and preferred for Intel native use. The professional user with Adobe Creative Suite 2 products can still use the programs with Leopard but only the newer CS3 releases will work at full speed as they are Universal Binary. Leopard comes with a large set of printer drivers, so you may be good to go right away, otherwise you'll have to download and install an updated driver for the new Mac. You may need to order updated disks for your favorite disk utility as the old ones won't have a modern Mac OS on it to boot up the newest Macs, so don't forget to get those. There may be things you have to leave behind that have not been updated for Universal Binary use.

I'm thinking of an example of a similar situation of a client having to forgo the use of a screen saver that has not been updated for the Intel world. In this case, unlike an PowerPC Mac OS X application that can run in Rosetta mode, the Intel based system will ignore any non-universal plug-ins and such. In in similar way, if you now have a Universal Binary *Photoshop CS3* or *Elements 6*, you will also need Universal Binary plug-ins to work well with that. Failing that, you have an option to run the application in Rosetta mode to then match the plug-in. It's a compromise you may try. Some people will make a copy of the application's folder and have one copy native for speed and a second in Rosetta mode for compatibility. That could include a plug-in that allows the use of the File-Import submenu to drive your scanner.

▶ I have a new Hewlett Packard LaserJet P2015dn and I like to use a lot of fonts and they print well in *AppleWorks* and *TextEdit*, but do not print well or at all from *InDesign*. These are TrueType as well as Postscript fonts from Adobe and others that I've had for 5-6 years. They do show in Font Book. The printer is setup with a Generic Postscript printer description. I didn't have a problem with the previous GCC printer.

You can have a few problems coincident with the printer change. First I would download and install the latest software from HP for your model printer. I wouldn't trust the software that came on the included CD which may be years old



depending on the lifespan of the model. Also Apple released a version 1.1 of their Leopard selection of HP printer drivers two weeks ago which includes the LJ P2015. You may have to delete the print queue and re-add it. Never rely on a generic driver or "Any Printer" in your Page Setup if you want optimum results.

I would use *Font Book*, in your Applications folder. Even if the fonts are missing the outlines or damaged, they will be listed. Highlight all the fonts in the middle Font column and then select Validate Font from the File menu. Make the window wide and select Fit from the size pop-up at the top right and

see if the font's look smooth. If they don't you could be missing the printer font for the Postscript fonts.

The TrueType fonts of course don't have

a separate outline font file. Adobe's software may be more particular and you may need an updated release of the font. On the other hand, Adobe relies on a font cache separate from Apple's font cache, which can get corrupted. You can use the freeware *OnyX*, under Cleaning - Fonts tab to delete the Fonts Cache for Adobe Systems (and then restart the Mac) to see if that's all there is to this problem which seems to be Adobe specific. You didn't mention what version of *InDesign* you have, but if it is out of date and not fully compatible with your version of the Mac OS X, that could be a issue too. It may just need a free update if it is CS3. Not long ago there was a version 5.0.3 updater.

### Mac OS X 10.5.4 and Security Update 2008-004 Fix Bugs

Apple released Mac OS X 10.5.4 today, a bug-fix update that touches on several areas. Recent security updates are included (though the recent ARDAgent vulnerability has not yet been addressed; see "How to Protect Yourself from the New Mac OS X Trojans," 2008-06-25). If you want to take advantage of the security updates without installing the operating system update, you can download Security Update 2008-004 for Intel (128 MB) and PowerPC (80 MB); security updates for Mac OS X 10.5 Server are also available for Intel (165 MB) and PowerPC (127 MB).

Designers will be relieved to discover that a problem with saving and reopening Adobe Creative Suite 3 files located on remote servers has been resolved. A pair of AirPort fixes deal with reliability of 5 GHz networks and poor performance when using Logic Studio or MainStage.

According to Apple's release notes, iCal sees the most improvements, such as resolving problems when deleting events, copying and pasting attendees between events, and reliability of shared meetings. Fixes in Safari center on improving performance and solving problems loading secure Web pages. Apple is still grappling with the way Spaces operates, fixing a problem where the Finder would become the active application when switching to a space instead of the program residing in that space, as well as an issue dealing with assigning applications to spaces in the Spaces preference pane.

This update also includes a number of new security fixes, including major updates to patch recent vulnerabilities discovered in the Ruby programming language. Two fixes close holes that could allow an attacker to

take over your computer if you were to visit a malicious Web site using Safari. One of those vulnerabilities is exploitable only if you have the Safari preference to "Open 'safe' files after downloading" set - this is a valuable reminder to disable that preference in Safari's General preference pane.

The Mac OS X 10.5.4 update also adds raw format support for more cameras, fixes a problem where X11 may not be completely installed, and improves L2TP VPN client reliability.

# MobileMe Repairs Itself for Little Old Me

My home MacBook's Address Book is finally, blissfully, in sync with the rest of my datasphere. As I wrote about in "MobileMe Fails to Launch Well, But Finally Launches," 2008-07-12, my work Mac Pro and my 2G iPhone both seemed to cope with the changeover for MobileMe without a hitch. Once the me.com Web applications started to work, I could see the same data either instantly or within moments at me.com, on the Mac Pro, or on the iPhone.

Not so with my MacBook. I tried everything. Reset the sync. Unregistered all computers with MobileMe and restarted. Deleted files in my Application Support directory. Used Console to read log files. Talked (unofficially) with some folks at Apple. Posted to the Apple forums. Nada. I even imported all my data from the Mac Pro into my MacBook's Address Book just to see if a corrupted record might have been the problem. Nope.

And, then, last night it just started to work. Nothing to see here, move along now. With all my systems synchronized, I am finally starting to appreciate the new push and semi-push (15 minute delay on desktop) efforts that Apple made. I updated some phone number information for my parents, and by the time I checked on my MacBook, the details were updated. I deleted some garbled contacts via me.com, and a few seconds later, they were gone from the iPhone.

- ▶ I use Microsoft Office 2004 and they use Office 2003 where I work and I exchange files via a USB Flash drive. If I get a new iMac and Office 2008, is that going to be a problem?
- Not a major one. While you should save your work in the new XML formats .docx, .xlsx and .pptx, you can also do a save as... and specify the older format for saving onto the flash drive. I would imagine they will upgrade to the newer generation sooner or later.
- ▶ I have a desktop Power Mac G4 and a Titanium PowerBook G4. Can I clone the system from one to the other.
- Physically with FireWire Target Disk mode you can, but the system resources needed by the PowerBook are different than the Power Mac, so some basic things may work, but others will not, it's likely to crash a lot. It needs it's own installation from the retail general purpose Mac OS X installation DVD. Update to the latest releases of Apple's software and then if you want you can migrate the rest (applications, data, mail, preferences) after that.

# ▶ I'd like to clone my computer now running Tiger before I install Leopard. How do I do that?



■ I would use the \$27.95 SuperDuper! 2.5 from Shirt Pocket to clone everything on your internal hard drive to an external FireWire hard drive. It will be bootable in case something goes wrong with the internal drive. Of course the external drive has to be Mac OS Extended (Journaled)

and have enough space to hold everything on your internal drive. It's a lot slower but free, but you could instead use *Carbon Copy Cloner* 3.1.1 from Bombich Software.

- ▶ I downloaded some cover art for my iTunes albums with a Apple widget, but many seem low resolution and look pixelated when blown up. How can I get better artwork?
- I've used LairWare's \$20 MPFreaker, currently at version

1.7.6 to download cover art and lyrics. It scans your iTunes Music Library, and shows it as a list in it's own window. You just select all and have it scan the Internet for the info, basically from the discogs.com database. I also have done searches on wikipedia.org and amazon.com for cover art and release date and track numbers. Usually the cover art there is pretty decent. You can also do a google images search to find cover art. It could take quite a lot of time to find what you want, but just drag and drop from Safari into the iTunes Info window when it's showing the Artwork tab.

- We updated our system but Epson didn't update the driver for it. We put in Windows and installed the scanner driver for the scanner and would rather avoid this option. Is there a web site you can go where you can find newer scanner drivers?
- Not exactly, but you can use Hamrick's *VueScan* with a wide range of otherwise abandoned scanners. Their standard version is \$40 and the professional version which can be used to create calibration profiles for your scanner costs \$80. Then there is LaserSoft Imaging's SilverFast SE which for \$49 also



supports, in scanner specific applications, a wide range of old scanners. Of course you could buy a new or refurbished scanner for maybe \$69 which is probably far higher resolution than your old scanner and they have a driver for the

new Mac. Particularly a good choice due to the likelihood that the bulb in the old scanner is not as good as it once was, perhaps the glass is now foggy or scratched and the real plus that the new software works like the old one you are familiar with. I see a Epson Perfection V100 PHOTO refurb. that is 3200



dpi and scans 35mm slides for just \$59 on Epson's web site. Their latest downloadble driver works with Intel-based Macs running Leopard. It's just not worth it most of the time to get new software for an old scanner. Just toss it and get a newer one.
