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

Bradley's Tech Session

This is a synthetic column, as there was no meeting and thus

no Q&A session in November.

- ▶ We have a Buffalo TerraStation ES NAS which is very slow and I understand will stop being accessible if we update our Macs to Lion or Mountain Lion because Apple removed SMB access. What would you suggest as a replacement for high performance? We use about 260 GB of data.
- A nice little Mac mini server will do nicely, but the trick is fast data access, so I'd use a LaCie 512GB SSD Thunderbolt Little Big Disk external drive for the data. It's very fast access time because of the RAIDed SATA III 6Gb/s solid state drives connected by the fastest interface would offer connected Macs and Windows clients the best possible response. If you ever need more storage, you can daisy chain another 512GB unit. You can repurpose the four 1TB drives from the NAS into a OWC Mercury Elite Pro Qx2 FireWire 800 for backup. Just add a compact display, USB keyboard and mouse, plug it into the UPS and copy your files over, take out the drives and put in OWC RAID box, reformat and backup. The server is way easy to configure. As long as the network switch is gigabit Ethernet, the access will be better than local storage. You can even add a second gigabit Ethernet connection via a Thunderbolt adapter if your switch supports port aggregation. This would help

if more than one user accesses the server at the exact same time.

Of course the server can serve more than just files, so it will be a great value to any other intranet uses like a FileMaker server, wiki server or web-based project management system.

- Why would I buy the new iPad mini for \$329 when I can get the iPad 2 for \$399 or a refurb iPad 2 16GB with 3G for \$399? It just seems too small to see well.
- While they both have the same resolution screen and can run the same iPad optimized apps, and use the same A5 chip, the iPad mini has some advantages. First off it's almost half the weight. Secondly, and this may not be a plus for some users, as it is smaller, most notably in width, you can hold it in one hand and tap on it freely with the other hand. The iPad 2 tends to be held in both hands, forcing you to tap on it with just the thumbs. That is assuming you are walking around with it, as opposed to having it on a flat surface or proped up in some kind of stand. Also the cameras are better on the mini and supports FaceTime over cellular if you get the WiFi + Cellular models. The iPad mini has stereo speakers on the bottom, whereas the iPad 2 is mono. One popular feature the iPad mini supports that the iPad 2 does not is the Siri personal assistant first seen with the iPhone 4S. Finally the mini uses the new style Lightning connector as opposed to the phasing out legacy 30 pin connector. That seems the better move going forward, admittedly

I am writing this President's Message on November 29th, one month after the Hurricane Sandy devastated parts of Long Island. Along the south shore, the

water rose is feet in places, damaging entire communities. Donald Hennessy said he watched the water come up his street and onto his lawn before retreating. Bernie Flicker told of the water coming up to the front of his house. On the north shore, we saw endless numbers of trees and power poles knocked down and in many cases taking the electric/cable system out of commission. A week later we had a nor easter/snow fall which damaged more trees and wires. With everyone trying to get back into action we found that gas stations were either without electricity or the gasoline supply was cut off from the original storm, forcing many to wait on long 3+ hour lines.

Through this experience, I understand that the majority of members were also without electricity for around 12 days and cable (usually telephone, Internet and TV) for an additional day or two and even more. Some members were more fortunate and some not. Everyone had a tale to tell - what an experience! Through the powerless days we found the local library a great source of electricity to recharge your cell phone, flashlight batteries and get on the Internet for information and connections, be it very slow because of the number of people on the same service. The cell phone had its own issues as connections were difficult because it was the only way to call for many days and many tower antennas were also damaged from the storm.

All in all, for me, it wasn't too bad an experience, except for the one night that the inside temperature reached 48°F. Looking back it was an interesting vacation and for some, it was very unfortunate. With all of this, LIMac cancelled the November general meeting and we hoped that was all that was lost. We should remember that people died and many had homes damaged or lost completely. If you can help, please do so. Help in any way you can with clothing, an older computer or anything else. Each of our communities has a donation center to help victims of Sandy, so please help where you can.

that could limit your present choices as it's pretty new. OK, so to be fair, you could say, for you, the iPad mini's case which has very slender frame on the left and right sides is a problem, and it's larger physical size makes it easier to type on the iPad 2. One little potential gotcha against the iPad mini. It requires for some reason, Mac OS X 10.6.8 or newer, while the older designed iPad 2 can work with Mac OS X 10.5.8 and iTunes 10.5. That could make all the difference if you are stuck with a vintage iMac G5 which can't run 10.6.8. One good thing I checked out is the new \$29 Apple EarPods, work with both the iPad 2 and the iPad mini. Don't confuse the new headset introduced with the iPhone 5 with the older Apple Earphones with Remote and Mic used with the iPhone 4 and 4S. Considering the various advantages and the \$70 savings, I think most people would choose the iPad mini over the iPad 2 unless they have some current connectivity problem with analog audio output or big fingers and no love of a stylus.

▶ What do you think of the new iMacs?

The 21.5" models are not even RAM upgradable, but they do at least have a decent 8GB of memory. The standard 1 TB hard drive is a generous capacity but it's only a 2.5" format 5400 rpm drive so the performance there is sub-par compared to every iMac before. The sound quality is poorer, so you may consider a \$40-130 powered computer speaker system. There is no sound input jack, but that shouldn't upset most users and USB audio converters are not expensive. The SDXC slot is now on the back, where it is hard to get at. Apple took out the FireWire 800

port, so keeping your external FireWire backup drives will require the Thunderbolt to FireWire adapter for another \$29. Somewhat surprising, Apple gives you two Thundebolt ports even on the 21.5" model, probably to make up for the lack of FireWire. The USB ports are upgraded to all USB 3.0 specs, so that is a welcome plus. That opens the door to buying inexpensive external hard drives with fast USB 3.0 interfaces instead of FireWire connections. Still, USB file transfers will require the CPU's attention, while a Thunderbolt to FireWire transfer does not, so backups thus connected will be less intrusive on the hourly basis that Time Machine prefers.

Having USB 3.0 ports also allows users to take advantage of the new USB 3.0 flash drives. You see USB 3.0 is about three times faster than USB 2.0. I see high performance card readers, no doubt preferred by DSLR users with CompactFlash cards. Especially the new 1000x speed (150 MB/ sec) Lexar Professional cards. I suspect we may see some USB 3 scanners, but most don't need more than USB 2 supports. There are a couple of specialty USB 3.0 scanners now. I also see industrial cameras with USB 3.0. I have heard of a problem for Windows machines that would have a problem when some printers are connected to a USB 3.0 port. Interposing a USB 2.0 hub resolves that problem. Not that you are likely to have many USB 3.0 devices just yet, but there are 4 port and 7 port USB 3.0 hubs should you need to connect many of these. Most USB 3.0 ports and plugs can be identified by the blue insulator, but Apple didn't do that on the iMac.


The screen is nicer than before with greatly reduced reflections. The base price

has risen to \$1299. If you are looking for a compact iMac, then consider the faster 2.9 GHz model with the somewhat faster graphics processor but do a Configure To Order online and add the Fusion drive upgrade for another \$250. That unfortunatly makes the machine a hefty \$1749

For that kind of money, if you can fit it, I'd go for the 27" iMac. It's base model is as fast as the faster model of the 21.5" but it's graphics chip is better still and the 1TB hard drive is a proper 7200 rpm 3.5" style. You can in fact upgrade the new 1600 MHz speedy SDRAM on the 27" model yourself. Good thing too, that OWC is selling a max RAM upgrade to 32 GB for a third of what Apple charges. Apple still offers for \$250, the option to replace the 1 TB hard drive with a 1 TB Fusion drive. What is well worth noting, but not shown on Apple's web site, is this 1TB Fusion

drive uses a 7200 rpm part, mated to 128 GB flash storage and not the slower 5400 HDD used in the 21.5" model and the Mac mini. Exclusive to the 27" is the option to get either a 3 TB 7200 rpm HDD for \$150 or a unique 3 TB Fusion drive for a whopping extra \$400. (Still cheaper than a base model Mac Pro.) By the way, the 3 TB fusion drive also has a 128 GB flash drive mated to a 7200 rpm drive. Apple dropped the option they had on the previous generation where you could have both a SSD and a HDD (as well as a optical drive)

So in summary, the new 27" iMac looks pretty good, with a third party RAM upgrade and external speakers. Check out the Logitech Speaker System X553 2.1 system. Stylish but compact companion for your iMac.

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
