W There is a Lot More to Microsoft WORD!

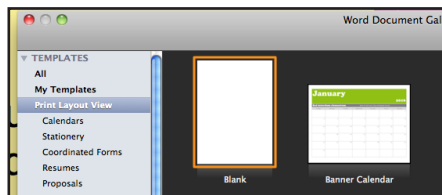
Many of us who use *Microsoft Word 2011* tend to be satisfied with knowing and using only a small fraction of its many useful features. We don't realize how our creativity can be enhanced by employing some of the many more available features. Two of our members Scott Randell and David Ross, teamed up to do this presentation.

Scott Randell, an experienced user, showed us how to get the most from the very basic, and often overlooked features, that can be used to create professional looking documents.

When you open *Word* you see the Document Gallery. *See Screenshot-1*. In the center pane of the window you can select from templates that are partially formatted documents or choose a Blank page and add your own settings.

After double clicking your choice, you will see three horizontal Bars, a Menubar, a Toolbar, and a Ribbon. *See Screenshot-2*.

The menus File, Edit, View, Insert, Format, Font, Tools, Table, and Help. Scott described and showed some of the sub-menus of each menu item. He also suggested new and experienced users should explore all the sub-menus.

June Meeting *Scott Randell*



Many LIMac members may not know the complicated process involved in the planning for our monthly meetings. It's easy to just arrive at NYIT at 7 PM on the second Friday of the month, grab a chair and wait for the show to begin. Sure, our current board of directors has been doing it for a long time now, and the equipment setup usually goes smoothly, but lately the presentation planning has become more of a challenge. It's more difficult to book outside companies for live demonstrations. Software publishers and hardware manufacturers don't have the budgets to send representatives on road trips to far-flung MUGs, and because so much information is currently available on the Internet they may not feel traveling around the country benefits them financially; they are all in business to make money, after all.

That's why the June general meeting is all about remote presentations. We'll focus on three different methods of communicating with a presenter in a far away location: Apple's *FaceTime*, Microsoft's *Skype*, and Google *Chrome's Hangouts*. We'll tell you what you can and can't do with each of the applications and demonstrate each one. One demonstration will include a surprise guest appearance by a long-time friend of LIMac who has visited us in person many years ago and now lives quite a distance away. I'm not going to say any more. You'll just have to come and see for yourself!

Following our usual agenda, the meeting will begin with two Q&A sessions; Bradley's in the main room and the MacBasics across the hall. Our remote presentation demonstrations will be next, followed by announcements and our monthly raffle.

Bradley's Tech Session

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► **My screen jumps around when I use my Bluetooth Magic Mouse.**

What's happening and how can I fix it?

■ I assume you mean your cursor is jumping around, not the whole screen. That would be seriously weird. If you have a recent Mac mini and USB 3.0 drives, there is a known interference problem due to poor internal shielding which will affect both Bluetooth and WiFi signals. The fix is to move your external hard drive farther away from the Mac. I'd plug in a good old USB wired mouse to check. The other thing I find is many folks have a mouse pad without a geometric design, perhaps a photo or some logo. An optical mouse like Apple's needs to detect light and dark changes, that's why glass top tables don't work for modern optical mice. The old school fabric top single color mouse pads work well as they offer regular and close spaced horizontal and vertical lines for the sensors to track the reflections. The only problem is they wear away, leaving fluff on your mouse's optics. I've recommended the 3M Precise Optical Mousing Surface which is said to be battery saving as well due to the light color. There are basically three varieties. The MP200PS is a flat 8.5 x 7 inch rectangular sheet with a sticky sheet on the bottom. Then there is the more two models with a gel wrist rest. The 8.6 by 6.75 inch MW309LE and the larger 8.6 by 6.75 inch MW310LE.

► **I recently updated my iMac to Snow Leopard and Microsoft Office 2011 is giving me problems. It freezes with the spinning beach ball. I don't recall what version I have.**

■ I would have to guess if you have quite old software and upgraded from *Mac OS X 10.5.8* to *Mac OS X 10.6*, then I would have to assume you also have not been updating your Office applications. If you go to the Help menu from any of the programs, say *Microsoft Word*, you will find Check for Updates. That starts up the *Microsoft AutoUpdate* program. You can click the Check for Updates button. It's not always effective, so you may need to download and install the updates yourself. From the initial install, I find you will need the version 14.1.0 upgrade first, the *AutoUpdate 2.3.6* update, the *MERP 2.2.9* update, and the final 14.4.2 update. I'm not sure it's really needed, but I usually install the 14.2.3 update before the 14.4.2 update. Furthermore, the *Office 2011* installer puts in several obsolete copies of fonts your Mac already has. You should use Apple's *Font Book*, select all and select Validate Fonts from the File menu. That should help you find the duplicate fonts. Choose Show Font Info from the Preview menu and look for the version number of both duplicates. Delete the lower numbered font. Don't just disable it. Don't go by the dates. While you are there, disable whatever fonts you are sure

President's Message



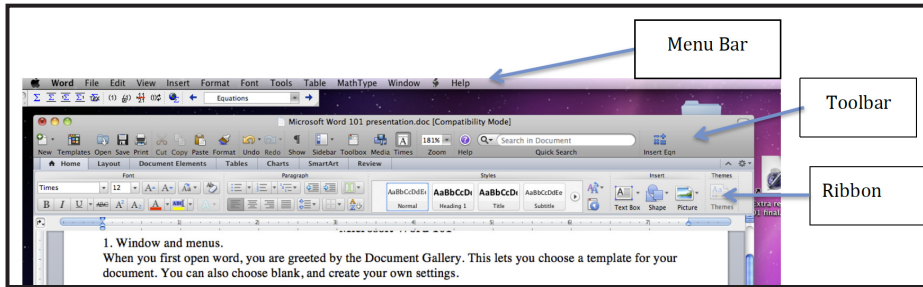

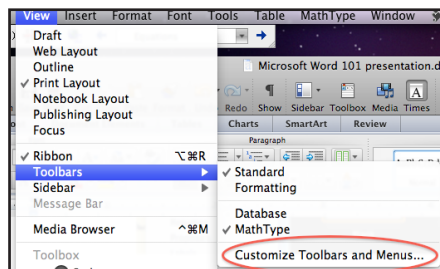

Next Scott showed the Toolbar. He pointed out what tools are available in the Toolbar. He showed what each Toolbar item does. In addition he showed how to add and remove items from the Toolbar. See Screenshot-3

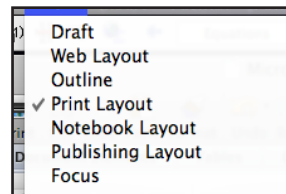

Scott then went on to the Ribbon. The Ribbon has 7 modes. Home, Layout, Document Elements, Tables, Smart Art, and Review. He went through some of these and urged the audience to experiment with the others.

He also showed the Views menu and demonstrated the Draft and Print Layout views. (See Screenshot-4) The question of why choose *Word* was discussed and basically the reason is, if you work in an

environment where coworkers use it and you are frequently exchanging and collaborating on documents the alternatives like Apple's *Pages* cannot retain the formatting.

Time went by quickly, so Scott skipped to showing how to create Personal Template for future use.

If this is something you would like to do follow the steps below.

1. Open a blank file from the template chooser. (File → New from Template → Blank)
2. Select the font you prefer, and set the margins. (Format → Document → Margins → see left image) You should also decide if you want headers and/or footers, which you

can do in the same dialog box.

3. Save this as a Template. (File → Save As → in the dialog box choose Word Template (.dotx) or Word Template 97-2004 (.dot). (See image on right.) (Brad suggested that using .dotx would be preferable because there would be fewer potential problems.)
4. Name your template, and then click save. Your newly created template will then appear in the document gallery under My Templates

David Ross explained when you should use *Word*. If you regularly work on documents with others who use *Word*, because formatting is not transparent from one program to another. He also showed *Apache OpenOffice* as an alternative to *Microsoft Office* and therefore *Microsoft Word*. Below are all the features of this **Free** alternative as he described them.

Apache OpenOffice (AOO) offers a suite of office applications:

- WRITER - word processor ●
- BASE - database ● CALC - spreadsheet
- IMPRESS - presentation ● DRAW - graphics
- MATH - formula editor

Each app is full-featured and robust without always duplicating one- for-one every *Microsoft Office* capability. AOO has its roots in *OpenOffice.org* (OOo) which originated as *Star Office*, developed by German company StarDivision in 1985. In 1999, StarDivision was acquired by Sun Microsystems for \$59 million, a less expensive option than licensing *MS Office* for a staff of 42,000.

Like *LibreOffice* and OOo, AOO evolved from Oracle *OpenOffice* in 2010. The sidebar interface was based on *Lotus Symphony*, donated by IBM in 2012. Despite the multiple code inputs, using AOO is intuitive.

Writer offers a long list of functions: document templates, frames, mail merge, a style manager, section-based headers and footers, and much more. The sidebar docking feature introduced in *Apache OpenOffice 4.0* is very useful if you have a wide monitor, as it's easy to place multiple panels so that all controls are visible and accessible.

Bottom line: Although *MS Word* may still be the gold standard for business and education, for a Mac owner considering a second word processor to “supplement” *Pages*, free is good. 🐘

Some of LIMac's future presentation methods will be on display and if you want to get a preview, you should make

it a point to be here. It will be more than “remotely” interesting, I'm sure! 🐘

to not use. There are several you won't be allowed to disable. Of course any font's that don't pass the test, disable them. If you have disabled a font you don't think you need, but you may later open a template or some old file that needs some of these fonts, I would suggest using *Font Book's* Preferences and turn on Automatic font activation. Now of course there may be other old programs running in the background that may need an update. Check your login items and LaunchDaemons and LaunchAgents in your /Library folder. Of course your whole Mac may be having problems because of directory damage or lack of free disk. Run *Disk Utility* and click Verify Disk and click Repair Permissions. It's also possible you now have less available RAM (memory) so you may be getting more spinning beach balls. If you have any PowerPC coded applications, you will have to install the optional Rosetta which was standard back in Mac OS X 10.5.x

► **I found some things in my Dock, the Microsoft Document Connection and Messenger. What are they and can I get rid of them?**

■ Normally I wouldn't bother to include this in the newsletter as most Mac users never use this application, but since I found a web site that explains it, I figured I might as well: <http://www.mactech.com/articles/mactech/Vol.25/25.07/NewToolsforCollaboration-IntroDocumentConnection/index.html> It comes with *Microsoft Office*, you can probably toss it from your /Applications/Microsoft Office 2011/ folder and off the

dock. *Messenger* was Microsoft's answer to *AIM* but it has since been superseded by Microsoft buying up *Skype*, so assuming you have *Skype*, you can get rid of this phased out software too.

► **I have a Imation USB floppy disc and since I updated to Snow Leopard, I have found that it can read a disk but not write to it.**

■ I'm thinking it has nothing to do with *Snow Leopard*. Two possibilities come to mind: A) You have forgotten that the HD micro floppies the drives can read have two square holes in them. One so a drive can detect it is in-fact a HD floppy and the other has a movable shutter. When the hole is open, the disk is write protected, and when the shutter is slid back up and closes the hole, you can write to it. I would eject your disk and move the shutter to close the hole. B) The other possibility is the drive is defective and despite the shutter on any disk, it thinks it's write protected. If you need a replacement, the LaCie 108045 or the Y-E DATA brand 4x USB 2.0 floppy drive, if you can find one, was the best. I'm not sure if the floppy heads are dirty, it would show as write protected, but they may need cleaning. See this other bit of history. Now you say this is a Imation drive. Could it in-fact be a LS-120 SuperDisk drive that could also record on 120MB special disks? I read a post on Apple's Support communities of a guy with *Mac OS X 10.6.8* on his Mac mini and his drive works. **UPDATE:** On further research at home, I found this web page, and I think I found out it is related to

Snow Leopard, but it's not really the drive's problem. It's the disk. The old disks were formatted with Mac OS Standard format, also known as HFS. *Snow Leopard* cannot write to this format but *Mac OS X 10.5.8 Leopard* could. So you have a couple of options. Ignore the write protect, copy the stuff off the floppies and throw them away. Throw away the drive. Copy 5,555 floppies worth onto a cheap (\$3.99 at Micro Center) 8GB USB flash drive. The other option is to copy the data to your hard drive, then use *Disk Utility* to erase the disk as Mac OS Extended AKA HFS+ and then you can copy the files back. Those HFS+ formatted disks can be read with a Mac running an operating system going back to 1998's Mac OS 8.1

► **I keep getting a message in my browser that some plug in is disabled and needs to be updated. What does that mean and how do I resolve it?**

■ It's probably referring to *Adobe Flash Player* plugin. When there is a known liability found, Apple will block your installed version and you may have to wait a few days for Adobe to release an updated release. Get the latest (version 13.0.0.214) for *Mac OS X 10.6*. or newer from here: <http://get.adobe.com/flashplayer/> If you have a fairly recent version of Adobe Flash Player, then you should also find a *Flash Player* System Preference panel (in the bottom 'Other' section) In the Advanced tab, you can click the Check Now button to get any existing updates. The Xprotect security system can also block Java web apps. *Mac OS X 10.6* uses *Java Runtime Environment 6* supplied by Apple, while *OS X 10.7.3* or later uses Oracle's *Java 7r60* or *Java 8r5* That is assuming you use *Safari* or *Firefox* as those are 64-bit browsers and *Google Chrome* is still a 32 bit application. ⤴
