QuarkXPress) and found them to be musthaves. But VectorTools (from now on called VT) is even more necessary.

There's so much going on in this plug-in set, that it'll take a while to realize all the goodies it brings to both Illustrator and Freehand. This is the sequel to Extensis' DrawTools, and if you use them now, VT will place them on your Desktop during installation for you to decide whether to continue to use them.

For Illustrator users, VT looks like the other Extensis Tools' plug-ins, using customizable toolbars with visually identified buttons (text also, if you desire) across the top of the Desktop that take you right to the action by clicking. You can choose from a complete list as well as create your own actions with a SmartBar that watches what you do, then makes a button.

VT includes these productivity tools:

President's Remarks

Is Apple a software company or a hardware company?

This question, often asked over the past few years, is re-emerging as an important issue, in light of recent announcements regarding their licensing and hardware plans. Just as the Mac clone makers start making headway, Apple has thrown in a monkey wrench by raising the fees charged to licensees.

Addressing this issue in his column in MACWEEK of 5/5/97, Henry Knorr (Editor Emeritus) suggests greater separation of Apple's hardware and OS businesses. Similar recommendations have been made concerning Microsoft's dominance in the OS & application market. However, Apple does not have the resources to pursue a strategy of being strong in developing both innovative hardware and operating systems. Just as I started writing this column, news comes that Apple's COO, George Scalise has quit. He came on board with Amelio and was promoted to be a COO just last February. Given the losses suffered, the resulting market perception regarding its financial condition, the revolving door in the executive ranks and staff cuts, can Apple really pursue a dual-OS strategy and keep producing innovative hardware? Both are required to stay competitive with the Wintel platform.

The clone makers have contributed a great deal in making the costs of Macs competitive with the Wintel computers. Apple itself had to change directions on their hardware plans a number of times in the past few months. The Exponential chip has been abandoned only a month after a prototype was shown and the Common Hardware Reference platform (CHRP) is about to be abandoned.

The power to be the best was provided by the revolutionary interface (GUI) and not the hardware (gooey!). Is Apple inhibiting the long term growth of the Mac OS by protecting their hardware sales in the short run? Can they overcome the growing perception with both the investment and developer community that there seems to be no clear sense of direction. To maintain a vibrant clone market – good for the Mac OS in the long term – Apple has either to separate the hardware side from the OS side, or focus entirely on the OS.

Technical Corner

▶ How many Macs are allowed on an *AppleTalk* network?

You can only have 10 Macs mounting a particular volume under System 7's Personal File Sharing, but the limit on the number of nodes on an AppleTalk network is in the thousands. You won't have a problem with 14 Macs all talking to one another and sharing a printer. The only problem you would have is if they are all connected with *PhoneNet*. The network bandwidth is limited to begin with and then divided by the number of devices trying to communicate simultaneously, so things will get really slow with 14 Macs on *Phone Net*. It would be much faster if you rewired for Ethernet, at least for the more speed conscious workstations which would support Ethernet better by having NuBus or PDS slots, or even built-in Ethernet. You can have a mixed network without spending for each Mac. You do have to worry about the end to end distance of your network wiring, but most offices are fairly tight, so it's not usually a problem. If you need for more than 10 Macs to simultaneously connect to a shared volume, or for just better performance, you would need to get a pre-configured Apple File Server or add the AppleShare File Server software to a Mac so it can handle the shared volume. Apple's latest is version 4.2.1 and requires a PCI PowerMac. You might be able to find the older AppleShare 4.0.2 for Quadra series Macs, or even 3.0.1 for Mac II series. A Mac running *Personal File Sharing* can only spend 50% of it's time in file sharing, so it's performance is modest at best. Use the shareware PowerShare 1.1 to increase the CPU time allocation for those if you relying on Personal File Sharing and can't afford AppleShare File Server (@\$1000). Of course, you have the usual problem of serial number copy protected software, checking for the same serial number on a copy of a program running on another Mac on the network.

▶ I'm having a problem in *Netscape*. I can copy outgoing e-mail to a file and I can browse around to specify where I want it to go, but I can't get it to stick. What can I do about this?

I never tried before, maybe your Preferences file is corrupted. I checked out the situation after the meeting and my guess is you didn't follow

Page tricks in Adobe Acrobat Exchange:

- ► Since most document-creation programs can't support multiple orientations in one document it's easy to forget that PDF files do. You can combine pages from any number of documents (in any number of orientations) within one PDF; and the pages will retain their various sizes. If you're coming from PageMaker, you can even put spreads in your PDF - a good way is to check the Reader's Spread option in PageMaker's Print Document dialog hox.
- ► To combine pages of many shapes and sizes within one PDF, use the Insert Pages... or Replace Pages... command from the Edit menu in Exchange while you're in the destination file, and select a file from which to take new pages. (Inserting will import all the pages in a file, but vou can select a range of pages when you use Replace.) You can also open the source and destination files and drag thumbnails of pages from one to the other.

the right procedure. In the Mail & News Preferences dialog box Composition tab, you see the choice there. What you probably want to do first is to bring up the Netscape Mail window and from the File menu, select New Folder and name it something appropriate, like Sent Mail. Then, what you want to do, assuming you want this to be stored somewhere else, is open the *Hard Drive*, open the System folder, the *Preferences* folder, the *Netscape f* folder and finally, the *Mail* folder. In there you will find Sent Mail and Sent Mail.snm. Move these two files to a folder in the location you prefer. Now close up all those windows and go back into *Navigator*. Go to the Options>Mail and News Preferences> *Composition>tab.* Click on the checkbox before Mail File and then hit the Browse button. Then navigate or browse to the folder you created that contains the Sent Mail and Sent Mail.snm files. Double-click on the Sent Mail file and click OK in the Mail and News Preferences window. Ouit out of *Navigator*, start it up again and check the setting. It should be OK now. Note the option is to save the outgoing messages to a file, not a folder, so you had to create the right kind of file and then move it to where you want it. By the way, use MIME Compliant in your mail settings in that same dialog box.

▶ I'm using FreePPP 2.5v2 & a Global Village TelePort Platinum modem. I'm using a setting regarding init string to rely on the TelePort Control Panel. What setting in the TelePort Control Panel should I use for compression?

Use V42.bis, it offers the best compression. I would suggest the *AutoDetect* init string function myself. Also update to *FreePPPv2.5v3* and *PPP Menu 2.0.3*.

▶ TelePort Platinum 28.8 is on sale for \$79, but the ad says it needs PowerMac or GeoPort serial port Mac. I have a Performa 631CD.

The Platinum uses the ninth pin featured on the GeoPort. If you have a non-GeoPort equipped Mac, then the connector won't fit. You can use other brands of 28.8 MODEMs, like US Robotics, because they use the standard 8 pin (Mini DIN 8) serial connector. The Performa 63x series do not use GeoPorts. But

not all PowerPC based models have GeoPorts. The Performa 52xx/53xx/62xx models don't have GeoPorts, either. The 54xx/6360/64xx models do, however. PowerBooks don't use GeoPorts either, not even the new 3400. You could go for a new, but pricier, US Robotics Sportster 56K X2 modem (\$220) and switch to an Internet service provider that uses them, like I-2000 and Hamptons Online. AOL is in trials in NYC for the X2 and will be later trying the competitive and incompatible K56Flex from Rockwell. If you have a good NYNEX phone line, and regularly connect at top speed, then you stand a good chance of getting the most out of a 56K modem.

- ▶ Will a laser printer print crisper than any ink-jet printer? Even the Personal Laser-Writer 300? I saw the ad for the Okidata OL610e for \$400, a 600 dpi PostScript printer that uses LEDs instead of a laser. Yes. The LED-based printer will print just as well as a laser-based printer at 600 dpi.
- ▶ If you print to an *PostScript* laser printer, do you have to use an *AppleTalk* connector? What if I use a switch box to switch to an inkjet printer like the Apple StyleWriter 2400?

Apple calls their connectors *LocalTalk*, not AppleTalk. AppleTalk is a network protocol. Most people use *PhoneNet* or equivalent connections nowadays. It is not recommended with newer Macs, but you could use a straight serial connection. You can still use an A/B box but you would have to make AppleTalk active for the laser printer and inactive for the Style Writer, as well as throw the switch and make a selection in the *Chooser*. You could get an AppleTalk adapter for the SW2400 (\$100) and use a *PhoneNet* connector instead of the A/B box and leave AppleTalk active. A set of 3 Phone Nets would be \$48. If you are not running *OpenTransport*, the transition from inactive to active would require a restart.

Rather than use the *PostScript* printer driver from the manufacturer, can I use the Apple LaserWriter driver?

Apple's latest driver is preferred to older version from third parties. The last version of the *LaserWriter Driver* was 7.2; the latest version of *LaserWriter 8* for 68K Macs is 8.3.4. The latest and greatest is 8.4.2.



TIP!

Some interesting applications found by the Editor while rummaging around AOL's software search lists:

SplitIt!:

Breaks down files and applications into parts that will fit on floppies, and can later be re-assembled for use.

FeatherGIF:

A *Photoshop* Plug-in for use on GIF files meant for the Web. It adds feathered edges to your images.

India Ink:

Another *Photoshop* Plug-in. This one converts images to cross-hatched lines.

Dos to Mac format with no PC junk. **Drop2Register:** Keep all of your applications' serial/registration



Sore Eyes

We know most netters are familiar with HOTWIRED, the online line newsletter devoted exclusively to all things and people related to computers. The URL is http://www.hotwired.com/frontdoor/. It is truly an all-encompassing publication, sometimes esoteric, sometimes very newsworthy and sometimes funny.

On the lighter side and to keep our members up to date on the latest terminology, The following are definitions excerpted from WIRED magazine's *Jargon Watch* department: **Astroturf.** A fake grass-roots political cam-

Astroturf. A fake grass-roots political campaign. Posted in RISKS DIGEST as a potential future problem in net-based issue campaigning where massive phony mailings are easier than ever.

Betamaxed. When a technology is overtaken by an inferior, but better-marketed technology. *Microsoft* betamaxed *Apple out of the market*. **Binary Star Configuration** (or *Bi Star*). Cybrarian. One who makes a living doing online research and information retrieval. Also known as a *data surfer* or a *super searcher*. Infobahn. Term being bandied about on Capitol Hill as a faster and more global-sounding replacement for the more cumbersome *Information Superhighway*. ■

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User Group Connection

In the September 1996 issue of the FORUM, I reported on a study done by the UGC, in conjunction with Para Technologies, designed to gather information about both Mac/Apple computer user groups and PC/Windows/DOS-based computeruser groups.

In this issue I would like to share some results of a follow-up study. The information below was supplied by the UGC.

User group members shown to be purchase influencers, heavy Internet users – Soquel, California; June 25, 1996: Approximately 70% of PC and Macintosh user group (MUG) members access the Internet, and 77% of members without access plan to be on the Internet within a year – according to a new study of U.S. Macintosh and PC user groups from User Group Connection (UGC) and Para technologies. In addition, 78% of members claim to influence an average of \$45,000 worth of work-related computer purchases per year.

The disk-based survey, which sampled Macintosh and PC user groups in the U.S., also revealed that PC and Macintosh user group members differ from each other in demographics, influence, and computer usage. In comparison, Macintosh user group members earn a higher (mean) household income (\$66,239 Mac vs. \$59,725 PC), and more MUG members have a college degree than PC user group members (77.9% Mac vs. 52.5% PC). However, more PC members are Chairperson, President, or Owner of their company (17% Mac vs. 33% PC). Despite these differences, the study supports similar findings from 1990 and 1992 studies, concluding most user group members are well-educated, affluent, and influential computer enthusiasts.
