Netscape Shortcuts.

By Victor Grey, DVMUG member If you're a frequent user of Netscape Navigator, you can speed up your surfing with tricks and shortcuts. Here are some that I've come across: Learn the keyboard commands for the things you do all the time. Command-L to open a URL. Command-R to reload a page. Command-[(open square bracket, that thing to the right of the P on most

keyboards) to go back to the last page, and Command-] (close square bracket) to go forward. Also Command-. (period) to stop a page from loading. With these keyboard commands, you'll not only save time, but also you can deselect the toolbar in the Options menu, and thus have more room in your browser window to see the Web pages.

You don't need to type in the http:// in the URL, because Netscape will add it for you by

default, but did you know that Netscape will also assume the www. and the .com? If you type into the Open URL window, for example openheart, Netscape will take you to http://www.openheart.com. Another neat trick uses text clippings. If you select a URL in a drag-and-drop-aware application, including both Eudora and Claris Emailer, and drag it onto the Desktop, it becomes a Text Clipping. Drag the Text Clipping into the Netscape

window, and you'll go to that URL. Rename the clippings so you remember what they are, and you have a collection of instant bookmarks, which you can drag back into an e-Mail or word processor window. And most amazing to me is if someone gives you a text file for which you don't have the application, even if its a PC file, just drag it into the Netscape window and the browser will display it for you. This also works for GIF format graphics files. Have fun!

Tracking changes in QuarkXPress:

If you've created custom tracking settings for your typefaces in QuarkXPress, beware of using keyboard shortcuts such as Shift-Command-B to create bold, italic, or bold italic versions of a regular-weight roman face. When you use these shortcuts, you get the tracking settings of the regular roman face, not the settings you specified for the other members of that family. To get your adjusted tracking settings for the other family members, select them explicitly from the Font or Character menus or in the Measurements palette. -Publish

Technical Corner

▶ I have an Iomega ZIP drive, Agfa StudioScan flatbed scanner and a Polaroid SprintScan+ slide scanner connected to my Power Mac 8500. It was fine for a while and then the monitor "wouldn't go on." A friend fixed it, but the problem came back. He took off the slide scanner and declared there was a SCSI problem. Can you suggest a solution?

When everything was originally OK, what

usually happens is that one of your SCSI devices was moved and a connection has come loose; a SCSI cable has become damaged; or one of the SCSI address switches was accidently changed to be the same as another's. I would check your SCSI IDs to make sure they are unique. Tape a bottle cap over the SCSI ID switches if you have to, to prevent accidental changes. Your 8500 has a design flaw, like all PCI Macs that causes erratic behavior if a SCSI device is set for SCSII ID 5. Since the ZIP can only be set for 5 or 6, make sure it is set for 6 and set your scanners for 2 and 4. One thing also to remember about the ZIP, since it doesn't have a on/off switch, if you change the SCSI ID switch setting while the drive is still on, the change won't take effect until you pull the power plug and put it back in. The internal CD-ROM is at 3 and your internal HD is set for 0 and your motherboard is 7. I assume the ZIP is first in the SCSI chain. so make sure it's termination switch is set to zero or Off. The scanners have no internal termination, so make sure you have a terminator, preferable an active one, at the end of the SCSI chain. Of course you should use only high quality double shielded (thick) cables, and keep them as short as possible. The faster Power Macs are more sensitive than the older Macs. ▶ I have a PowerComputing machine running Mac OS7.6. When I try to upgrade to Mac OS8, I get a warning that the Installer cannot update the hard disk drive and don't install until you do update. What do I do? The Apple installer runs Apple's *Drive Setup* software and looks for a Apple brand hard drive. Your clone does not have a Apple hard drive, but a hard drive formatted with FWB's Hard Disk Toolkit. You need to contact FWB for an update to the latest version, 2.0.6, or the upcoming Mac OS8 optimized 2.5. You will have to boot up your clone with the Power CD and use the FWB Crisis disk to update the

Have you noticed the latest ruse by America Online? It's worse than the spamming and advertising from which they

claim to protect you. Having overextended themselves by offering unlimited time on line and trying to alleviate the problem by installing more modems, etc., they've finally decided to take it out on us. Each session is now policed by timer programs. If any inactivity is perceived, even a couple of minutes, you are immediately asked if you want to stay on line. This applies to e-Mailing activity, membership areas and especially surfing the Net using your own *Netscape* browser. The notice window goes unannounced by any alert sound, and is usually placed in the center of the screen so as to be hidden beneath any window you may have open. If that doesn't work, the inquisition continues with alternative queries that (graciously) allow ten minutes to answer. These are randomly timed at anywhere from 20 to 45 minutes. Once disconnected, the AOL application locks up for several minutes until it notices what happened and allows you, after having discovered the reason for the cessation of all screen action, to begin the re-entry procedure. Very frustrating.

I have complained several times and only get self aggrandizing e-Mail about how well AOL is doing in answering this and many other user

complaints. I don't think anyone reads the complaints, only by a fileserver using an allpurpose letter. I have also had this technique applied to me on an inquiry about a mistakenly billed list of AOL hours. I got no satisfaction, only another copy of the bill. That's called "stonewalling," I believe. Very tricky.

I'm told that the only answer to these problems is to leave AOL for another service. I'm thinking about it.-*The Editor*



Forcing Black Type to Overprint:

In most programs, black type always overprints any colored object behind it. If you ever need the type to not overprint, define a color as a 99% tint of black and use it for your type. It will still print totally black, but you can assign this color any trapping values you'd like.



Tabs in QuarkXPress: QuarkXPress's tabs aren't limited to lining up on margins and decimals – they

can align type on

any character. In the Tabs dialog box (*Command-Shift-T*), chose *Align On* from the *Alignment* popout menu, then type in the character on which you want the alignment.

driver on your internal startup drive. When you restart afterward and try to install *Mac OS8*, you will get the same message, but you can choose to install it anyway. Don't forget to update the drivers on all your removable disks as well. Iomega's latest software for ZIP and JAZ drives will automatically update disks as needed when they are inserted. For people with old machines using non-Apple hard drives formatted with any software that was never updated to work with *Mac OS8*, you will need to get a universal formatter like *Hard Disk Toolkit*, back up your hard drive, reformat it with HDT and then restore before the *Mac OS8* install.

▶ I have Eudora Light (shareware e-Mail software) version 3.1. I can send messages, but I get an -36 i/o Error: "Message could not be saved," when I try to receive my mail. I reinstalled it, and allocated extra RAM to the replacement. Netscape's mail function works fine. Qualcomm wants me to buy the Pro version for tech support.

The -36 Error means your software has a problem writing some information to your hard drive. It's not *Eudora*'s fault. The reinstalled copy is trying to write to the same place on your drive. You should backup your whole hard drive and do a thorough media test. You may have to reformat and map out bad sectors. You may have a SCSI problem with your cabling and/or termination. The Pro version would have the same problem. It's a shame they couldn't point you in the right direction by understanding the -36 *Error* code.

▶ I have a Power Mac 6500 using a USRobotics 56K Sportster, dialing into LINet's 56K line, it disconnects a lot. I get a Type 3 error on reconnect, forcing me to restart. Any suggestions?

Their *PPP* dialer is at fault. You need a new one. Record your settings and toss the *ConfigPPP* control panel and the *PPP Extension*. Get the U.S. Robotics High Speed modem script for *ARA* and/or *OT/PPP* from USRobotics' web site. Then install *Open Transport 1.1.2* and *OT/PPP 1.0*. Then, put the special modem script into the *Modem Scripts* folder inside the *Extensions* folder inside the *System* folder. Configure *TCP/IP* to use *PPP* and configure the *Modem* control panel for the Sportster x2. Then set up PPP with LINet's phone number,

your account name and password and give it a try. I'll bet it's faster and more stable.

▶ I have a *PPC* using FWB's *HDT 2.06*, then I added a LaCie external with *Silverlining Lite*. Should I replace the *Silverlining* with the *HDT*?

That would be best. The fewer drivers loaded the better. You should back up the external to the internal if you can, then do a quick initialize with *HDT* and then put things back.

▶ I have an HP DeskWriter. When I print, I get the message "Can't locate PrintMonitor," so I have to manually load PrintMonitor. I'm running System 7.5.3. I don't know what version of the HP software I have. Update to the last version of the DeskWriter software, version 6.0.3, and get HP Background v4.0.6, all available from their web site. (There is a link to it from our user group web site.) Follow the links to Web sites of interest to members, then Hewlett Packard under the Software for Hardware group. After you install Desk Writer 6.0.3 first, you'll have to manually remove the old HP Background from the Extensions folder and replace it with the 4.0.6 version. Also get rid of the older version(s) of the DeskWriter/DW Chooser Extensions. Your particular problem is related to HP Background. I would guess it's disabled or corrupted or maybe something was moved or renamed.

• I don't have the option to put the monitor to sleep. How do I do that? I have the Apple 15-inch model.

Not every monitor supports the Energy Star system, and thus cannot be put to sleep. If you mean the Apple Multiple Scan 15" Display, you need to go to the *Energy Saver* Control Panel to set the *Monitor sleep time*. You may have to click the *Show Details* button to set the time for just the monitor's sleep, independent of the Mac itself. If you have the old Apple 15" portrait display, grayscale only model, then it cannot be put to sleep. Some Macs don't support the *Energy Saver* Control Panel. Try a shareware screen saver like *Eclipse* from Ambrosia Software.

Alignment in *Freehand*:

To force one object to center on top of another without moving the object you're trying to center it on, select the object you want centered and Cut it. Then, select the object on which you want it centered and change your page view to 100 percent. This centers the object in your display. Now, Paste the object you cut and Freehand pastes it in the center of your display. Simple? - Publish
