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

The 2000 MacWorld Expo saw Steve Jobs introduce the new desktop line. The G4 minitowers saw no MHz speed increase, but the 450 and 500MHz models now sport dual processors, each with their own 1MB backside cache. The revised motherboard now has gigabit Ethernet and support for the revised ATI Rage 128 Pro video card that replaces the DVI connector for a new Apple-specific Apple Display Connector (which includes USB and power connections). This flat glass 17" CRT studio display and a revised Apple Cinema display. The 21" studio sisplay has been discontinued. The new video card still has the VGA connector, so any multisync CRT monitor can still be used. Any DVI connected monitor will not work. The iMac got updates, too - now there

are four. Incrementing clock rate (from 350 to 500MHz) and disk space, are the iMac, iMac DV, iMac DV+, and the iMac DV Special Edition. The base iMac will be at a new all-time low selling price of \$799.

Apple introduced new colors: indigo, ruby, sage, snow– retaining Graphite. The really new machine is the G4 Cube: The guts of a G4 minitower folded into an eight-inch cube floated in a clear plastic sleeve with small speakers.

The new desktop models feature extended keyboards and oblong-shaped optical mice – both with excellent feel.

Other items were the new 100-year-printlife Epson Stylus Photo 2000P, and the excellent Nikon Coolpix 990. The first *Firewire* to SCSI adapters were there, as were many new USB mice and trackballs shown by various vendors. Software introductions of note at the Expo were Connectix *CopyAgent*, the preview of *Microsoft Office 2001* and Apple's *Mac OS X*.

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

drop your files. Another interface feature of note is the progress bar. The progress bar displays your transfer rate (also in its downloading file icon), estimated time remaining, all in the standard *Mac OS* look. The main screen also has it's own Trash Can so you can delete files easily. The program even supports *Contextual Menus*.

Easy to use, but full of powerful options: Sometimes when a program is easy to use, you lose features. That's not true with *Transmit*. *Transmit* has many powerful features.

Download resumes:

Transmit can resume downloads. This will only work if the server you are downloading supports download resuming.

Get Info:

Much like the *Finder's Get Info* command, pressing *Apple-I* in *Transmit* will display the file size, and

location info. It also has allows the site's owner to set permissions.

Graphic Preview:

If you forget what you named your latest graphic file, one simple file drag to the graphic preview windows shows you a thumbnail of the image.

All in all, *Transmit* is very powerful.

You must first have a conv of Netscape Navigator or Internet Explorer started up and a CD in the CD drive. Open a new browser window (Command-N). switch to the Finder, and drag the CD icon to the empty browser window. You should see a complete disk directory of the CD's content in an easy to use format that will allow you to easilybrowse each folder.

#### **Book Review:**

Start With a Digital Camera By John Odam Peachpit Press 1999 ISBN 0-201-35424-1 \$34.99

After taking a course in the use of a digital cameras with the Learning Edge in Suffolk County, I thought that I already had a good start in the developing world of digital photography. Then I picked up a copy of *Start With a Digital Camera* by John Odam and realized how much I didn't know.

The subtitle of this large-format soft-cover is "A guide to using digital cameras to create high-quality graphics." That's a good subtitle because Odam leads the reader through many aspects of digital cameras, photography, and the graphic arts.

The book is filled with good examples of digital photography for those of us who are visual learners, (Continued on page 3)

## **Technical Corner**

▶ Which do you recommend DSL or cable?

Cable service is faster and cheaper than DSL and will be available to more homes than DSL, due to DSL's limited cable distance from their central offices. Because of this limitation there will be widely scattered circles of coverage by DSL, as opposed to Optimum Online, which can offer blanket coverage in areas serviced by Cablevision. I say can offer, since they are in the process of updating central Suffolk county with fiber optic cables and new switching equipment. Most of Nassau and Eastern Suffolk county already offer Optimum Online. Optimum Online doesn't allow you to connect servers to their service, nor is more than one machine permitted to share the connection, but many people have found a regular Ethernet hub or a hub/router allows them to share the service. DSL providers don't care what you do at your end. Cable users share clusters of shared access in their neighborhood, so they may find a slow-down of their throughput as more neighbors get the service. The Optimum Online service is a do it yourself deal if you already have family cable service or better for TV. The DSL line must be provisioned and set up by a provider like Bell Atlantic, which could take many weeks to do. ▶ Using PictureIt or Graphic Converter,

I can't seem to always make a proper StartupScreen. What am I doing wrong? I often use Adobe *Photoshop*, but *Graphic* Converter 3.9.1 should work as long as the file is RGB at 72 dpi and at the same pixel dimensions and color depth as your monitor. When saving in StartupScreen format, do not use Compress with Stuffit and do not use Create LOWSRC nor Save web ready, but do use Set Format from Extension. Do not change the default file name and save loose in the System Folder. In Photoshop, I save as a PICT Resource (ID=0), no layers, named *StartupScreen* where capitalization matters. I guess you're not paying attention to the horizontal and vertical pixel numbers (i.e. 1024 by 768) or too high a color depth (millions may not be supported) or not using exactly 72 dots per inch.

If you find a preference file with a generic document icon, does that mean it's no good?

Not necessarily. It could mean you just need to rebuild your *Desktop* file, or it could mean

If you have a Beige G3 and you want upgrade the processor, you had better check the manufacturer of the voltage regulator module. If the voltage regulator module was made by Royal Technology you must change it before upgrading or it could cause serious damage to your computer and or the new processor. Voltage regulators made by other companies do not cause a problem. You must actually open your computer and look at the module or the chip in it to determine the manufacturer. Also, while at Macworld Expo, I got a chance to look at the new low-priced laser printers. For the money, the Brother printer seemed to be the best. The prices start at \$299.99 (and for \$499.99 you can get a 600x1200 dpi laser printer that includes Ethernet and emulated Postscript 2).

# TIP!

#### Easy iMac Resets:

The standard Apple control raset command doesn't work on most iMac's, so you are forced into using another way to reset your computer:

#### The Homemade Reset Button:

- Straighten out a paperclip. Cut off a 1-inch piece with tin snips.
- ► Get one of those large pencil erasers .
- ▶ Push the paperclip section partway into the end of the eraser.
- ► Get a piece of strong, electrical tape .
- ► Carefully position the end of the paperclip so it sits just inside the Reset hole. There is a tiny ledge, which will hold it in place.

# ► Tape eraser in place. The iMacButton:

A small piece of plastic, with a pin attached to it with an adhesive pad used to attach the device to the iMac.You basically take off the adhesive cover, and position the papercliplike metal rod, over the iMac resets hole. Make sure that the adhesive is sticking firmly, and if so, you're done. Whenever your iMac crashes, just press the clearcolored iMacbutton. and your iMac resets. The iMac button sells for \$9.99 plus shipping, and is available from www.imachutton .com.

that you no longer have the creating program on your Hard Drive. If the program is not on the Startup Disk, the Preference file may never get the right icon. Some programmers never give their unimportant files icons via their bundle resources, so it could be normal. Most programs can recreate a *Preference* file if you delete the old one. Some items you may find in your Preferences folder are obsolete preferences from an older generation of a program you may still have and were not deleted when you upgraded to a newer version. Try creating a holding folder on the *Desktop* and drag these suspects into it. If there is a problem, you can always put it back. If no problems arise, then delete the

▶ I got a used Mac with an old copy of *QuarkXPress 3.1.1*. How can I find it's serial number and to whom it's registered? The splash does not show this when it starts up.

If you hold down the *Option* key before and while you select About QuarkXPress under the Apple menu when running the old Quark, you will get the Environment window, which should give you the serial number. You should also be able to take a blank floppy disk and recreate the registration disk at this point. On the registration disk will be a text file with the information entered at the time the software was installed. A name, address, company and phone number should all be there. It's very likely that the company who bought the *Quark* in the first place still owns the license for it or it's newer version. You would have to get their permission to transfer legal ownership to you if you wanted to use the software.

What is the purpose of rebuilding the *Desktop* and how often should one do it? I wouldn't say any particular internal of schedule is required, only as required. The purpose is to re-establish the link between

an application and the documents it creates. If you have just installed a major upgrade to a program or removed a program or if you double-click to open a file you created and get the message that the creating application can't be found, then it's time to rebuild the *Desktop*. You may find damaged or incorrect icons on documents or applications. Your applications may have minor damage to their bundle bits, so first run Norton Disk Doctor or TechToolPro. Once the question of obvious damage is cleared up, then you can perform the rebuild. Do it with the base set of Extensions running, as many third party items can interfere with the rebuild. If you normally run without the old Mac Easy Open or the new File Exchange, then start up as Extensions Offinstead of the Mac OS xx Base set. After the icons load at the bottom of your screen at startup, hold down Command and Option keys. For as more thorough rebuild, instead use the shareware TechTool 1.2.1. Reset your Extension set (if needed) and restart as per usual to finish

▶ I'm experiencing problems with *Type Reunion*. What programs install this, so I can find it and replace my copy?

Obviously some Adobe product like *Page-Maker, Photoshop* or *Illustrator*. If you're running an older operating system, then the *Type Reunion 1.2* should still work, otherwise you will need to upgrade to the commercial Adobe *Type Reunion 2.5.x* or *2.6* for compatibility with *Mac OS 8.5* or newer. The old *Type Reunion* may corrupt its *Preference* file called *Type Reunion Data*. You may only need to delete this file and restart.

#### Quark 4.11 Error: "Too Many Files Open."

There is a documented a problem in QuarkXPress 4.11 for Mac OS which causes the error message "Too Many Open Files. (-42)" It is triggered by moving picture files from their original location after they have been placed in a QuarkX-Press document. This causes QuarkXPress 4.11 to load the images into the System's memory multiple times, and they are not removed from memory until QuarkXPress has been Quit. Closing the document containing the imported pictures will not remove their "open" status from System memory if QuarkXPress remains
