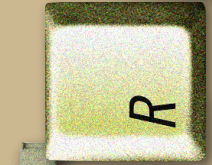
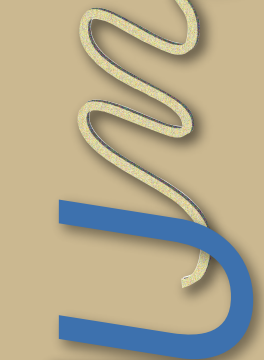

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► **I'm trying to hook up two USB printers for use in Parallels Desktop. It only acknowledges one and not the other. What about my Epson Perfection 1650 scanner?**

■ You can't expect every old printer to work. Some of the biggest problems is that the printer software for Mac OS X won't let go and play nice with the request from the guest OS in Parallels' Desktop. Particularly mettlesome are the multifunction printers, as their scanner drivers are always polling the printer/scanner for input. I found this knowledgebase article to be of use: <http://kb.parallels.com/en/5156> and <http://kb.parallels.com/en/5053> You may find it easier to just change the default printer within Mac OS X's System Preferences - Print & Fax pane and let Parallels send the print job to that, rather than installing print drivers for the two printers within Windows. While Windows should detect the scanner, you may find that the Windows based scanner driver may not see it. Try leaving the scanner off until you start Windows. I hear USB hubs can interfere with proper communications and you are forced to plug in directly. Besides all that, people seem to prefer VMware Fusion 2.0.1 to Parallels' Desktop 4.

► **I have that same scanner, the Epson 1650, I hear I can't use it if I get a new Intel Mac.**

■ That's not entirely true. They don't have a universal binary scanner driver for the old scanners, but the *Epson Scan* application, while only having PowerPC code, can still run with the transparent Rosetta emulation part of Mac OS X 10.5 and thus you can scan and save the scanned image and then open that image with a Intel native version of *Photoshop CS3* or *CS4* or *Photoshop Elements 6*. As a matter of fact Adobe no longer included the twain (scanner) plug-in with *Photoshop CS4*, as they claim it can cause crashes. Without the twain plug-in, even a native scanner driver would not allow you to see the scanner in Photoshop's import menu choice under the File menu. If you wish to take the small risk, you can download the *Photoshop CS4* optional plug-ins which includes TWAIN, PhotomergeUI, ContactSheet II and Web Contact Sheet II. <http://www.adobe.com/support/downloads/detail.jsp?ftpID=4047> By the way,

there is a more expensive but perhaps more satisfactory solution, buy a new scanner. I had a Epson Perfection 4180 scanner which was fine and offered 4800 DPI scanning, but like your 1650 scanner it was an older model and Epson didn't release a updated scanner driver that was universal binary, which would be needed if I wanted to preserve that traditional option of importing directly into *Photoshop* on my next Intel based Mac Pro. It was a refurbished model I bought for \$99 when my old scanner gave up, which was a Epson 1670. If you checked now, the Epson Store has a Perfection V300 Photo for \$99.99 which supports version 3.50A universal binary TWAIN scanner driver. When I checked I saw the Perfection V500 Photo which has a superior 3.4 Dmax and DIGITAL ICE which had gotten great reviews for removing scratches and dust. It uses a LED "ReadyScan" light source instead of the old cold cathode fluorescent bulb, so it didn't take any time to warm up and better for the environment when IT'S time comes. It also came with the better *ABBYY FineReader 5 Sprint+* which was a step newer and better than what I had before. It was \$126.65 with free shipping and no sales tax. On top of that deal, there was a \$50 rebate coupon for any purchase of the V500, refurbished or not, so I figured it's a bargain for a better and faster scanner. Heck it was black and silver, so it better matched the Epson Stylus Photo R280 printer near it anyway.

► **I understand the Mac OS X is UNIX based. Can I run .rpm packages on it directly?**

■ RPM package files are for Red Hat Linux which is based on a different flavor of UNIX. There is a Mac OS X application called RPMinator for working with the files in these packages. A more fully functional solution is to run *VMware Fusion* which is best know for supporting Windows on the Mac, but it also supports four different varieties of Red Hat. See http://www.vmware.com/products/fusion/resources/system_requirements.html. Theoretically you should be able to recompile the source code for a Linux application to run on the Mac natively. As the Mac comes with the Xcode development environment, a simple program should be able to be recompile without too much trouble. The latest version for Leopard is 3.1.2 and the update is free to any ADC member and anyone can sign up for free for a download such as this. I would expect the average user would just go with the *VMware Fusion* route and not start programming and

testing a converted application. On the other hand, if you find a X11 (X Window System) based application, then Mac OS X can run and X11r7 compatible application un-modified. For older Mac's the X11 part was a optional install. For more info, read <http://developer.apple.com/opensource/tools/runningx11.html>

► **I have a Power Mac G5 with two internal hard drives. One has Tiger, my usual boot disk and one has Leopard. The Tiger drive is failing, so I want to copy the whole hard drive to it's replacement. Should I use SuperDuper! or Carbon Copy Cloner? The new drive should work just like the old one, right?**

■ Either should do the job, but in my testing, I found *Carbon Copy Cloner* to be much slower. I ran *Activity Monitor* and looked at the disk activity and found long pauses and thus low throughput with *Carbon Copy Cloner*. The free version of *SuperDuper!* should be enough for a basic clone. Just pull the Leopard drive out, move the soft screw-in bumpers to the new drive and put in the replacement blank drive and Tiger will realize the drive is unformatted, so you can then format it with *Disk Utility* and then clone it with *SuperDuper!* When finished, remove the old failing Tiger and put back the Leopard drive. Of course with the Power Mac G5, in order to remove the drive in the upper bay, you have to pull the lower drive out as well as it does not come out straight. As for the replacement drive working just like the old one, the only trick is to name it the same as the old one. That can be a little tricky when it comes to cloning from the old drive to the new one if they have the same name, you could be confused. So you have two choices to tell them apart; you could give the old drive a custom icon so you can tell them apart or you can give the new drive a different name initially, run *SuperDuper!* and then change the name afterwards.

► **What type of drive would I need? I'm thinking about 500GB.**

■ You need a serial ATA style drive, usually shown as SATA. The Samsung Spinpoint F1 series are the fastest. I see at newegg.com, the 500GB model with 16GB buffer is \$59.99 while the 750GB model with the 32GB buffer is just \$74.99. There is no sales tax charged and free shipping.

► **I have a G5 running Mac OS 10.4. Will Photoshop CS4 run on that?**

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■ Yes, you need a G5 as a minimum with Mac OS 10.4.11 and 512MB of RAM and a 1024 by 768 resolution display at the least. Most Power Macintosh G5 models in use I would hope meet that requirement, but the lowest end models came with just 256MB of RAM and many iMac G5 models came with just 256MB. So while Mac OS 10.4 could run with that little memory, I wouldn't advise it in any case, certainly not for a Photoshop user.

► **Can a user upgrade his Mac running Mac OS 10.2 upgrade to 10.4 without ever owning 10.4?**

■ Yes, the retail version of Mac OS 10.4 could upgrade from 10.2 or even Mac OS 9. There was a drop-in Mac OS 10.4 upgrade DVD shipped with some Macs that shipped shortly after Mac OS 10.4 came out. This disc could only upgrade from 10.3. Of course the Mac in question would have to meet the system requirements for Tiger, so it has to have a native G3 or G4 processor and have built-in FireWire and the aforementioned 256MB of RAM memory and at least 3GB of disk space left. Mac OS 10.4 uses up more RAM than 10.2 did. Also the retail version came on a DVD-ROM, so ideally the Mac needs a optical drive that can read DVDs, otherwise you would need to find the four CD-ROM installation set. It may be hard to find these nowadays. Also if searching for old Mac OS X install discs, avoid buying the kind that came with a particular Macintosh. They don't have the resources needed by every kind of Mac, just that model, so while it may install without an error message, it's not likely to be fully functional and will be unstable on a different model Mac then it was intended for. You should look for the retail boxed version which is multi-purpose. Of course updating from two generations old a operating system begs the next question, what about all the other software on the computer? All kinds of drivers for scanners and printers would need an update if available, and all the applications and utilities. Be very wary of any old startup items and system preferences panels that will need to be removed before updating to avoid a problem with the new system. Norton Utilities for example would have to be removed first.

► **I used to use PaperPort Page Manager under Windows. What is the preferred thing for the Mac?**

■ What is pretty cool is DEVONtechnologies DEVONthink

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Pro Office. It works with serious Fujitsu scanners like the ScanSnap S510M Sheet-Fed Scanner and *ReadIris Pro* OCR software. There is also Ironic Software's *Yep* and of course *Adobe Bridge* and *Acrobat Professional*. There hasn't been a PaperPort for the Visioneer compact scanner for the Mac in almost a decade and it's wasn't much good. I know that Nuance sells *PaperPort Pro* for Windows still.

► How do I make a NTFS volume read/write to the Mac?

■ You could try (I wouldn't) the free *MacFUSE* version 2.0.3.2 and *NTFS-3G* version 1.5130U1 or use Paragon Software's *NTFS for Mac OS X* version 6.5.1 which is \$40. The Mac OS X has built-in support for read-only access to Window's NTFS format volumes. This would be most useful for people using NTFS formatted external hard drives or folks using Boot Camp. You can download a 10-day trial version of the preference pane at <http://www.paragon-software.com/home/ntfs-mac/download.html> On a related if reciprocal note, there is a program for Windows machines called *MacDrive* by Mediafour which allows Windows to read Mac's HFS volumes, which can be used in Boot Camp's Windows environment so it can see the Mac partition or perhaps for a Windows machine to read a Mac formatted external flash or hard disk drive.

► I have a white Intel iMac 24" and sometimes I get this pattern on the screen which I can wipe away by moving a window around. I can also clean it up by invoking the screen saver by taking advantage of a hot corner. Sometime I get big squares. Any idea what is causing this?

■ This is a known problem. I've seen it on other iMacs, even the earlier iMac G5 with the Radeon video chip. It seems a video card driver defect or a hardware defect. Apple has said it can be fixed with a software update. I'd suggest installing *smc-FanControl* http://81.169.182.62/smcfancontrol_2_1_3_1.zip, and up the lower fan speed limit to keep the innards cooler. I've heard that installing *ATI Displays* software can help with the ATI Radeon X1600 video card problems. See <http://ati.amd.com/support/drivers/mac/atidisplays4-5-7.html> ↗

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Review - *iPlayMusic Beginner Guitar*

Let me start out by saying it took me a while to go through this software package. I had to determine who would be the audience for this software, and if it would benefit the target audience. The iPlayMusic system is advertised as a way to learn "the essentials you need to start playing songs right away, without learning complex theory or reading music!" (This is a quote from the company's website http://www.iplaymusic.com/store/product_info.php?cPath=22_23&products_id=33). In looking through the software I can safely say that a person willing to put in the time, and dig into the program can accomplish just that.

Installing the program requires a minimum of a

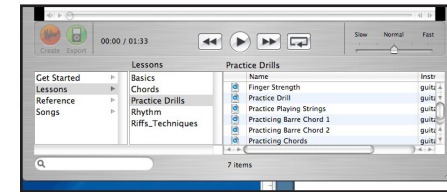
- Macintosh computer with a PowerPC G4, PowerPC G5, or Intel Core processor 733 MHz or faster
- 512 MB RAM
- GarageBand 3 or later required to use the included GarageBand projects
- Mac OS X v10.3.9 or v10.4.3 or later, v10.4.4 recommended
- iTunes 6.0.2 and Quicktime 7.0.4
- DVD drive for installation
- 10 GB of available disk space*

Now that the software is installed, you are ready to begin your lessons. The interface is simple and straightforward. (See screenshot below) The software works quite well and I found no problems running it. On the right you will find a control that says slow - normal - fast. I found the normal made the most sense the slow and fast setting sounded funny. If you are a beginner I suggest you start out by viewing the Quickstart video, and proceed to the Step-by-step Guide. The videos correspond to the guide and should be viewed in the same order. You might need to stay on a particular lesson longer but that is OK. I suggest you start out by learning a couple of chords, and then jump to a song using these Chords. It may take you a while to go through the introductory material, so be patient.



Once you have gotten through the introductory exercises, etc. the program gives you a few songs to learn. There are songs from several different styles of music: blues, country, folk, rock, and a few others. You should follow the songs that go along with the lessons, because they include the chords needed for that song. There is also a section in the lessons called "Practice Drills". These are exercises meant to increase

finger strength, and they are good for all students. When your fingers get stronger you will play better. See the screenshot below.



on "Rhythm" and "Riffs_Techniques". These will take you a while to go through.

The coolest part of this program is that you can create your own version of each included song in GarageBand. You can then add and delete tracks. You can for example delete the rhythm guitar track, add your own, or just play along. If you want to add your own track, iPlay music gives you instructions on how to do so. In order to do this you will need some additional equipment. To be able to record your guitar, you will need a USB microphone, or something like the Griffin iMic <http://www.griffintech-nology.com/products/imic> and a standard microphone. You can also use the Griffin iMic to plug an electric guitar, or acoustic guitar with a pickup directly in. The image below shows the button to hit in order to export your song to GarageBand.



The lessons on chords teach you to play the various types of minor, major, and seventh chords. Each of these is contained in an individual lesson. When you get more advanced you can go through the lessons

In conclusion, this is a very good product for people who want to begin learning the guitar. Like anything else however, you must put in the time for this to work for you.

If you do you can easily learn the basics and be able to play a few songs within a few weeks. If you already play a bit, you will love the GarageBand integration. The price of this software is quite reasonable for what you get. The level one DVD is \$19.95. You can buy all three DVD's (Level 1, Level 2, and Lets Play Music Together) for \$39.95. You would pay much more for one lesson with an experienced teacher. I would suggest however, that after a while going to a teacher would be beneficial. An experienced teacher can check your hand positions, and answer any questions you may have immediately. You also get that interactive guidance that a technical solution such as this cannot have. Even though the package is advertised as a way to learn without reading music, I think that not learning to read music notation will put you at a disadvantage in the long run. Once you can read you can pick up any piece of music and learn to play it. Perhaps the iPlayMusic people will include some sections on reading in a future version. Just to summarize, iPlayMusic is quite good for getting you started playing the guitar, or as an extra resource for those who already play a bit. If however you want to go further, find an experienced teacher with a good reputation. **Scott Randell**
