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June's Meeting



At June's meeting, Tom Abruzzo, an expert from the Apple Store at Walt Whitman Mall, demonstrated the new *iMovie '08*. This new version contains many features that will help you create a movie

quicker and easier than previous versions. Before I continue you should take note of the system requirements, which are quite steep. *iMovie* requires a Mac with an Intel processor, a Power Mac G5 (dual 2.0GHz or faster), or an iMac G5 (1.9GHz or faster). 512MB of RAM (1GB recommended).

- ▶ High-definition video requires at least 1GB of RAM.
- ▶ Mac OS X v10.4.9 or later.
- ▶ You also need a 4-pin to 6-pin FireWire cable.
- ▶ Tom listed the types of video cameras that *iMovie* supports. They include:
 - ▶ Mini DV, Flash Memory, Hard Disk Drive (HDD), and DVD media.

**Back Up Your Mac!**

Do you back up regularly? Be honest, you don't do you. You know you should, but... We've all heard the usual excuses, "I just don't have to; It's too complicated; My Mac is running fine; ..." You know there's an axiom in the computer world that says it's not if your hard drive will fail, but when it will fail.

Even if your disk hasn't failed (yet), there are other events that can cause data loss. All it takes is a power failure, or even a power spike or brownout; a mistaken file deletion; a virus attack (well, fortunately not that one on a Mac, but you get the idea). To avoid losing important data you must back up regularly. Just how often and when is up to you. But do it!

At July's meeting some of LIMac's own will discuss and demonstrate their favorite methods of backing up, from simple Finder copies to automated, scheduled backups using commercial software or shareware from various developers.

As usual, the meeting will begin with Bradley's and the MacBasics Q&A sessions in their respective locations. Following the main (*July's Meeting continued on Page 4*)

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Bradley's Tech Session

► **I just started using a Mac a couple of months ago. I have a web based Gmail account. When I open up my mail on the Mac, it doesn't delete it from the server. If I open the mail on a PC, it's shows there. Is there a way to have it delete the mail on a Gmail account?**

What I do for Gmail is I've enabled POP (under Settings and then Forwarding and POP/IMAP) but if you intend to fully manage your mail from more than one computer, then I'd use IMAP. The important issue here is, "When messages are accessed with POP" I've selected "delete Gmail's copy" Then I don't get my Gmail via a web browser, I use Microsoft *Entourage*, part of the Office suite, but one could use Apple's *Mail*. There it is also important to be sure that the messages are not left on the server. That is set in the Options tab in Accounts in *Entourage* and in the Advanced tab in the Accounts preferences in *Mail*. If you are still using the web interface, then I'd have to guess your cookie settings are not allowing Safari to delete the messages. Check the Security category and have it Accept cookies 'always' and not just 'Only from sites you navigate to'. If you are using IMAP see <http://mail.google.com/support/bin/answer.py?answer=78892> IMAP mail is stored on the server, while POP mail is normally stored after delivery only on your one local computer. Gmail, AKA Google Mail used to be invitation only and now it's open to anyone. Most ISP's offer only POP e-mail which can be a problem when you are often away from your home computer. The free IMAP service is valuable to people who use more than one computer. The service has a good spam filter, so it's often less hassle to use. Not to mention you get 2GB of storage space for your mail and attachments can be 20MB in size (after encoding), about twice what most Internet providers support. Google also offers Google Calendar to share your appointments and Google Docs which are Web 2.0 apps for word processing, spreadsheets and presentations. You can also upload and pre-

► **I have the last of the PowerBook G4 models and in recent months I've had a strange noise of something rotating but out of balance. I had the hard drive replaced about a year ago. I figure if the hard drive was making that much noise it wouldn't be working at all. So I figure it's the fan but it hasn't made any noise lately, so I'm thinking the fan has died altogether. Can I spin down the drive and listen for the fan?**

Not so much. If you put the computer to sleep to spin down the drive, the fans will also stop. I would figure that if the fans were dead, the computer would overheat if you use it modestly enough to tax the CPU which would normally spin up the fans to cool the machine. The last of the PB G4 was the 1.67GHz models in 15.2 and 17.1" displays. There were two blowers in that model, a left and a right on the heat sink assembly in the back. There was only one fan in the 12" model. I would suggest the free iStat application, the iStat pro widget, or the \$10.78 shareware Hardware Monitor to display the actual fan(s) speed(s). I can't tell you what is a normal range for the fan speeds, but zero rpm when the CPU is doing something intensive like converting a video into another format would indicate a failure. Under normal conditions, they should be practically silent in the first place. Maybe you blew the dust from the fans and the problem has been resolved, they spin slowly and quietly most of time. Otherwise I'd expect your PowerBook to be running hot and perhaps locking up from the overheating. A wobbling sound could also come from the optical drive if there is a disc or a part of one stuck in there. Have you tried reading a disc lately? If you still suspect the hard drive, does the *Disk Utility* show a failed SMART status? To be thorough, you could run a test with *Drive Genius* or *TechTool Pro*. If you have AppleCare, then *TechTool Deluxe* would do. I replace more computers because they are not well taken care of. For your own sake, or at least for the pity of your computer, please blow the dust out of your Mac and peripherals periodically. Breathing is important to your Mac too.

► **I need help getting the music on my 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ RPM LP albums into iTunes. I've tried the Griffin iMic with Freeverse SoundStudio. I get the sound of the fan in my laptop. I saw a \$150 USB turntable in a Brookstone catalog.**

Sounds like you have the input switch on the

iMic set for Mic instead of Line Level Switch or perhaps the laptop is ignoring the iMic entirely and using the built-in microphone. Make sure you have "iMic USB Audio" selected in the Input tab in the Sound System Preference panel. There is also a setting in Sound Studio Preferences for input source where you want to set it for the iMic as well. Of course you could try Griffin's own Final Vinyl application. It's Preferences - General tab, make sure you select iMic USB audio system under Device. Of course the turntable should be connected to your receiver to amplify the turntable's signal and to apply the correct RIAA equalization. The iMic should be connected to a line-level output, such as a tape out (sometimes labeled PLAY) via the included dual RCA plug to $\frac{1}{8}$ inch stereo phone plug Y-cable. By bypassing any microphones, the recording should be reasonably high quality. You may have to experiment a bit on setting input levels (gain) to get the most dynamic range out of the recording without clipping at the loudest passages but not too low as to be lost in the noise floor. While the USB turntables can be useful for many people, you already have a good turntable and the digitizing hardware and software. You just have a fix a few settings. The USB turntables are great for someone with a desktop computer where setting up the computer near the stereo system would be difficult. By the way, many computers have analog audio input connections so they don't need a iMic digitizer in the first place. The Ion brand turntable is perhaps best known because it's been on the market for the longest, but Stanton, a well respected name in cartridges sells the T.90 USB Turntable which gets slightly better reviews plus it does the old 78 RPM records too. It's twice the price if you can find one in stock and unless you need 78 ROM playback, you can find the Ion for \$120 at Sam's Club. For those interested in this type of thing, Ion also makes a dual cassette player with USB out. It supports Metal and chrome Type II Hi-Bias tape types. ↗

it will auto-detect most camcorders when connected. It will allow you to transfer your video to the internal hard drive, or an external one. Next he demonstrated how to choose clips you want to include in your movie. He also showed how to resize and edit each individual clip. You might want to add music to your movie; well Tom showed how to add music directly from your *iTunes* library. It should be noted that *iMovie '08* can include music in all of your movie or, for only clips you select. You can also change the music, for each clip. In addition to music you can also add sound effects where you choose, and adjust them to suit the scene.

To further enhance your movie, you can add transitions and titles. These are usually

appropriate when you include still pictures as part of your movie. Transitions can be edited quite easily. As for the titles, they can be before the frame, or included in the frame.

To conclude, Tom showed the various ways of sharing your movie. You can choose to make a DVD that will play in a computer, or a set top DVD player, convert it in to a *iTunes* version of the movie that can be played on an iPod, or iPhone, or make it small enough to post on the web.
